






PATRONAL FESTIVAL of ST. THOMAS OF CANTERBURY

AN ALTERNATIVE CHRISTMAS RECIPE

Take a germ of an idea, a careful selection of ingredients, a large dose of creativity, a good measure of optimism, and encouragement by the head chef. Stir it all up for a seasonal offering and knead enthusiastically. It could fail to rise, but given the right conditions there is a fair chance that it just might prove well. Provided of course that you could rustle up a group of eager folks with an appetite for a charity event, a charity well established in the village.



The foodbank in Lapford exists because there is genuine need and it is supported because it is truly valued. In a year of COVID with all its consequences the food bank has been a lifeline to some, and worryingly, as we move into 2021, with the fall-out from a devastated economy, the numbers of those in need may increase.

Real communities are about coming together when dark clouds gather, setting aside differences, and creating the sort of spirit which shows cohesiveness and caring. So the idea of a Christmas Fair to offer locally created produce and gifts, with cakes and hot drinks at the Ark to bring some much needed joy and in the process raise funds in aid of the foodbank was how it all came about.

Of course there was a need for social distancing, so no one could enter inside, but the goods were displayed in the windows to choose from on a "look but don't touch" basis. Would it work, would it rain, would people think it a good idea, would people come?

Yes, Yes and Yes to all of these. Many people came over a three hour period on two separate Saturdays and enjoyed the opportunity to stand apart and chat with others who had been virtual strangers for weeks. Those who turned out to show their support dug very deeply into their pockets, sometimes twice or thrice. The normal Ark arrangements applied, with no fixed prices, just donations and those donations were far more generous than the organising team had ever imagined or hoped for.

As the minutes passed it became clear that the generosity of folk in Lapford was boundless and the notes passed over, often with no change wanted, grew into quite a pile. The first Saturday event, organised very quickly, raised an astonishing £300, and demonstrated that it could work safely. With more advertising, including an entry in the Lapford Lookout, perhaps this could be matched on the second Saturday. As the pop up shop closed and the count was made the eyes of the team of helpers grew ever wider. And this was truly a team effort, with everyone playing their parts at a safe distance, whether front of house or back room. So very big thanks and pats on the back to each one involved, you know who you are and your brownies are now very pointed.

After such an event clearing up could be a pain in the neck but the euphoria of the team meant even that was not an unwelcome chore, because the second Saturday had yielded over £540 in donations which, added to the first event total, meant there was a wonderful sum in excess of £840 plus handed over to support the activities in the foodbank in the year to come. As the products were still on display in the windows of the Ark, which would be opening on five days before Christmas, that sum may grow even more.

If you were one of those who supported the Christmas Fair the team want to send a heartfelt thank you to every single one of you for showing that you care. Good on you Lapford for showing what Christmas spirit means.






WILD LAPFORD: TREES

This month's article is inspired by the recently announced BBC's Countryfile "Plant Britain" campaign who have pledged to plant 750,000 trees in the UK over the next two years to help combat climate change. They want our help!

What can we do? Quite simply, plant a tree! Or if you are lucky enough to have the space, plant lots of trees. However, make sure that you plant the right tree in the right place, for example if you have a small garden, select a small tree such as a dwarf apple rather than a giant oak. The Woodlands Trust website is full of useful advice.

The Woodland Trust is currently offering FREE trees for schools and communities in an effort to plant 50 million trees over the next 5 years. Let us all get our heads together and find the places around the village that would benefit from some tree and hedge planting. Between now and March is the perfect time to plant trees, so let's do it! Please get in touch via email (below) or using the Wild Lapford Facebook group with your ideas.



Why should we care about trees and how can they be part of the climate change solution?

Trees, like all living organisms, are made from carbon. It is the release of carbon into the atmosphere (forming carbon dioxide) that is the primary driver of climate change. Burning of fossil fuels plus activities such as global deforestation are the mechanisms by which carbon is getting released at a rapid rate since the industrial revolution.

Research by University College London estimates that there are 25 tonnes of carbon stored in one single mature beech tree. Imagine how much is stored in an entire forest! Trees are the longest living organism on the planet. They could lock away a huge amount of carbon for a very long time. Yet due to deforestation there has been a 50% reduction in woodland during the last century in the UK alone. Ancient woodland accounts for only 2.4% of land in the UK, but is practically irreplaceable so the few ancient woodlands we have need protection.

Trees are the planet's lungs: Photosynthesis is a biological process that trees and other green plants use to convert carbon dioxide in the atmosphere to carbon which is then stored inside the tree and oxygen is released back into the atmosphere for us to breathe. This removes pollutants and improves air quality.

Trees help protect the land from flooding: Approximately 50% of the weight of a tree is water. The bigger the tree, the more water it holds. This water is drawn from the ground, this lowers the water-table around the tree. In a time of increased rainfall and flash flooding trees could make the difference in flood prone areas. Species such as willow and birch are ideal for damp ground and flood prone areas.

Trees support biodiversity: A single mature oak tree is host to around 2500 different species of wildlife, of these, about 200 are species of invertebrates (to name but a few, beetles, butterflies, moths and their caterpillars). A myriad of fungi, mosses and lichens grow on the bark. Around 40 species of bird nest in trees; blue tits, great tits, woodpeckers and nut hatches make nests in holes in the trunk and branches. Corvids (including jackdaws and rooks) build nests out of sticks high up in the canopy. Mammals also make their home in trees; squirrels build their drays in holes. Bats will roost in holes and behind loose bark. Down on the ground below the magnificent oak, the acorns in the autumn will provide a high protein snack for larger mammals including deer and badgers, these acorns will sustain small mammals such as mice and squirrels.

As if all the above isn't reason enough to love trees, they are extremely beautiful in all seasons. Take a walk in some woodlands and admire!

Like the first compliant show in October, this last one was held at the Grange Equestrian Centre near Okehampton. With almost 150 people entering the day was long as compliance required only groups of 6 could compete together. It was a big logistics task to sort out the groups, but

luckily this was mostly out of the Club's hands; it was just left to us to ensure these groups did not mix and more importantly to make sure everyone

enjoyed the opportunity to work their dogs. The Club had been overwhelmed by kind comments and thanks which made all the hard work well worthwhile. The Show was the first of the Club's annual winter league and two more will take place in the New Year. The Club is grateful to both Jonathan Wood Vets and Orchard End Kennels for their sponsorship of all three Shows.

The Club continues to have a long waiting list for obedience classes. These are now held at Serstone Farm outside Bow. Nine puppies from the last session, which ended just before lockdown, passed their Kennel Club Good Citizens award and most are continuing further with their training. To comply with Covid Regulations the groups have to be smaller than when held in the Victory Hall. However the Club has sufficient space to run two groups at a time and trainees are benefiting from having more individual support. It was sad to have to shelve the Christmas parties which we usually have for both dogs and handlers but it will be bigger and better in 2021.

Kath was helping on the farm from a very young age and also helping out with her siblings and when she left school she came home to work on the farm full time.


Kath met Les Phillips and in November 1950 they married at West Worlington Parish Church.

After their marriage, Les and Kath moved into Rensey Farm, Lapford where they farmed together milking cows and then mixed farming. Kath and Les had 3 children Margaret, Colin and Susan who all still live locally. Sadly in 1976 Les suddenly passed away at age of 55 and Kath was left running the farm, which she did so until 1979.

She then moved to a small holding on the edge of Lapford and there carried on farming a few sheep which she really enjoyed. She became involved with lots of organisations in the village and was a keen supporter of the Church and she produced a kneeler which is still in Lapford Church in memory of her husband Les. She was part of the WI and enjoyed all kinds of crafts and sewing and through this she made many friends. She was also a keen knitter and joined the local knitting group. She did knitting both by hand and by machine and made many garments for relatives and friends and she continued hand knitting right up until her death. She also volunteered with the meals on wheels service delivering meals to the elderly in the village. She had a big garden and when she could do it enjoyed gardening, especially growing her vegetables. Kath was a member of the over 60s and enjoyed many outings with them.

Kath continued to live in Lapford independently until January 2020 when she went into Abbeyfield in South Molton for the winter months and due to the COVID restrictions stayed there, however still living semi- independently up to her death.

Kath was a Devonian through and through and even though farming life was not easy in those days, she always had a smile on her face and a cup of tea ready for anyone that called in on her. She was a great mum, gran, great gran, sister and friend to all that

REPLY TO JENNY GRAY



Dear Jenny,

Thank you very much for your question about cleaning out hedgehog houses (December's Lapford Lookout). It's wonderful that you are providing a home for hedgehogs in your garden. You have done exactly the right thing in clearing out the old nesting material from the house. Hedgehogs are host to a number of parasites, so clearing the old bedding out ensures that these parasites don't build up over a period of time. It is also a good idea to clean the house with boiling water to kill any parasites that might be left, but don't use bleach or disinfectant as this will put the hogs off as they have a very sensitive sense of smell.

Make sure the house has no leaks or damp areas. Try to locate it in a sheltered area where there is plenty of cover (plants etc) and at the edge of the garden as hogs don't like to be out in the open. Place a small scattering of fresh bedding material inside the clean, dry house and leave lots of fresh bedding material next to the house. Hay and dry leaves seem to be preferred. You could keep this material dry by placing it inside a large plant pot turned on its side so the hogs can drag it into the house and make their own nest.

Remember that hedgehogs often wake from hibernation in mild periods, during this time they sometimes relocate to different nests, so you may have the nest-box of choice later in the winter. Hedgehogs can be fickle creatures, so please don't lose heart if you don't see any this year. They will be back, especially if you leave food out for them!

BIG FLOODS OF SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER 1960

On Friday 30th September 1960 there was extremely heavy rain during the early hours of the morning with up to 2.75 inches of water in 12 hours. Another heavy rainfall on Saturday 1st October added to the flooding, and then again on the Sunday 2nd during the late afternoon and evening. More torrential rain on Thursday 6th in the evening sent new floods across the area, the River Yeo rose 5ft in 4 hours. Gerald Leach shares his personal memories of that week.

I left the workshop in Wembworthy at 5pm on the bicycle, hoping to get home to Nymet Bridge. I had already been informed that Nymet Bridge was under water for the first time since April 1933, that is when my father and mother lived there from getting married. So, that night near Eggesford Station level crossing, I encountered the water at the bottom of New Road Hill. The water was going over the top of the railway fencing. I said to myself, "Gerald, where do I go now? Oh, I know, there is a cattle crossing over the railway, underneath Eggesford Barton in past Eggesford Church etc, to take me out on to the main road near to the forestry cottages". That was a bit scary with plenty of water around and it was pitch black. Also, I might add, the platform at Lapford station was under water. The railway rails you could just about see under Nymet Bridge with its five arches (not a lot of those between Waterloo and Ilfracombe on the Southern Railway Line) under which the mail and newspaper train went at 5am, a good alarm clock. It also saw the Devon Belle, the Atlantic Coast Express and a special football train for Bideford AFC for an FA Cup match.

So, the next hurdle would present itself on reaching home, where I found a bicycle light along with a note telling me that the wife and baby boy (six weeks old) had gone up to Nymet Rowland to Hele Cross Cottage (Tuckers). I made my way up there and we stayed until 10 o'clock. We then walked back down, she and I, to see if we could be able to sleep at home that night. Thankfully the water had gone down, but of course a bit of a mess was left behind because the Ambrosia filter bed had been flooded out.



Earlier in the day two friends had come down from up Nymet to see how the wife was coping. They left the baby in the pram, shut in the front room, so they could go up on to the railway bridge to see how bad the amount of water was going down the river Yeo. On returning to the house, they tried to get into the front room, but were not able to because the square of carpet had wedged itself behind the door, thus resulting in getting two men from Nymet Mill to push it open. Well done Mr Farley and Mr Rookes, a job well done.

So, eventually the Navy turned up with dryers to dry the house out. Has anyone tried drying out cob walls with such powerful dryers? Anyway, the next day the floods were back, this time in and out during daylight hours. Eventually though, the dryers did do the job, but it was never perfect again, even to when we left Nymet Bridge in August 1963.

Do fifty things you have never done before.


Take more photographs, then you can look back and see what you have achieved over the year.
