

Lapford Weather Review

LAPFORD WEATHER NOVEMBER 2021

The overall temperature was bang on average, but only half the mean rainfall.

Up to the 20th it was quite a mild month, with the highest temperature on the 10th at 14.2°C. There were however a couple of grass frosts during this spell. From the 21st to the end of the month it was much cooler, the coldest day being the 27th with a maximum of 5.0°C. The temperature fell to -2.1°C on the night of the 29th, with a sharp grass frost of -6.1°C.

Total rainfall for November was 52.6 mm. The wettest day was the 30th with 11.9 mm. The windiest day was the 26th with a gust of 46 m.p.h.

The autumn as a whole was a little milder and drier than average. There have been three milder autumns in the last 34 years.

LAPFORD CHURCH GREEN TRUSTEES

The recent AGM of the Church Green Trustees considered a new set of objectives for the Church Green charity to be discussed with the Charity Commission. This has become necessary as the present Governing Document dating back to the gifting of the Green in 1909 is completely outdated and no longer reflects the way the Green is used and managed. The draft objectives are set out below for information and comment.

Trustees of Lapford Church Green Draft Objectives:

- To keep and maintain Lapford Church Green as an open green space for the enjoyment of the public, including visitors to the village, to support socialisation, health and wellbeing, relaxation, and social inclusion; and to enhance the village's attractiveness as a tourist destination and its ability to improve its economic prospects.
- To manage the space, including the Melissa Lake shelter, in such a way as to enhance the usefulness and scope of adjacent public amenities by providing open space for quiet relaxation, outdoor gatherings entertainments and community events; to support the annual village Remembrance event and other such appropriate village events as may be agreed at any time by the Trustees; and to provide safe and secure connectivity between adjacent open spaces and facilities.
- To enhance the setting of the Grade 1 listed Parish Church and War Memorial (Grade 2 listed) together with other listed buildings in the centre of the village so enhancing the understanding and celebration of its culture, history, and civic pride.
- To invest in strong asset management principles to ensure continued functionality and the ability to meet emerging community needs; and to ensure that the space is suitably protected against future negative impacts.
- To ensure that the community's needs and aspirations for the space are addressed through appropriate community engagement.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL REPORT – 1ST DECEMBER 2021, HEART OF LAPFORD DEVELOPMENT BOARD REPORT

The HOLD Board provides this December monthly update to Lapford Parish Council. These reports are published the following month in the Lapford Lookout and available from the Lapford Village Website https://lapfordvillage.co.uk.

As notified in the last of these reports the HOLD Annual General Meeting was held on Saturday 16th October at the Victory Hall and was open to all to attend. The Annual Report & Accounts were published in the November issue of the Lapford Lookout. The draft AGM Minutes of that meeting are attached to this report.

Matters for urgent consideration by the Council: -

- a) The Grant Agreement states: "At all times during the Grant Period, HOLD shall procure that up to one person nominated by the Council shall be appointed as a director of HOLD." The HOLD Board is most concerned that, despite previous requests, the Council has not nominated a replacement for Ian Hemsworth, who retired in June 2021.
- b) In finalising the remaining grant payments HOLD is also concerned the Council have not yet agreed to the joint finance meeting requested last August.

With the exception of the work requested by the Church Green Trust, Phase 1 is complete and all available grant funds have been committed to eligible expenditure.

Through this report HOLD urgently request the Council to determine both requests a) and b) at the December meeting.

With the purchase of the site now known as Lower Town Place and the completion of the first phase, HOLD has been reviewing its own governance as previously reported to the Council. The detail considerations are written-up in the December edition of the Lapford Lookout (page 4).

The Board recommendation is to register with the Charity Commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation known as a CIO. To ensure the widest possible involvement of the community consultation with local organisations and Members will happen in 2022. Draft proposals and documentation have been drawn up for these consultations. HOLD will report progress at a future meeting of the Council.

The HOLD Board looks forward to meeting Council representatives to discuss and progress a) and b) above.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, DECEMBER 2021

Please note this is a summary of the main points of interest. A copy of the draft minutes will be made available on the Parish Council website, and on the notice boards in the Orchard Centre and in The ARK.

The Parish Council met on 1st December 2021 in the Victory Hall.

Two members of the public attended.

- County Councillor Margaret Squires had met with Steve Tucker, Highways Officer, and driven around the area to look at various Highways issues in the parish. Cllr Heal will arrange a meeting with Steve Tucker to further highlight local issues.
- The Church Green Trustees had met. At the AGM the following officers were elected: Chair Sue Briant-Evans, Vice-Chair Pat Gowie, Minute Secretary Pat Gowie. The accounts for the year and the Chair's report were accepted. The draft objectives for the Charity were approved. The meeting following the AGM agreed to approach the Parish Council re the shortfall in funding to restore the bank between the Church Green and Lower Town Place. The Chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter had been inspected by a tree surgeon and was healthy for now. One branch would be removed for safety reasons. The Trustees would take over the planting of the containers by the War Memorial from the Church Wardens, who were thanked for their hard work in keeping the planting looking so lovely in the past.
- Councillors agreed to grant £2,000 to the Trustees to make up the shortfall in the bank restoration funding on the understanding that the bank could in future be designated a memorial for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022.
- The Heart for Lapford Development Board submitted its monthly report to Councillors.
- Lapford Emergency Action Plan Committee had met. All the village grit bins had been topped up for the winter. Road Warden Training is ongoing. Volunteers working on any Parish Council projects would be covered by the Parish Council insurance. Outstanding local Highways issues were highlighted to the meeting.
- It was agreed to run a public consultation through the Lapford Lookout about the future of the clock in the Church tower.
- A grant of £1,900 was agreed to enable the Lapford Youth & Playing Field Trust to proceed with the felling of dangerous trees bordering the Playing Field.
- The new Parish Council website was now active and can be accessed on www.lapfordparishcouncil.org.uk
- The Parish Precept for the year beginning 1st April 2022 was set at £22,216, an increase of 3.77%, in order to ensure good financial management at a time of great uncertainty.
- The Parish Council will meet again on Wednesday 5th January 2022 at 7-30pm in the Orchard Centre.

DAN KIRKHAM

As some of you will already have heard, our youngest son Daniel took his own life at Meldon on 10 October. He was thirty eight.

Although Dan was quiet and contented as a child, depression set in during his early teenage years and he subsequently made many attempts on his life, on those occasions always backing out at the last moment when he found he couldn't go through with it.

He leaves a wife, Annabel, and their three year-old son, Leo. His funeral was held at Exeter Crematorium on 15 November and his ashes were interred in Nymet Rowland churchyard on 19 November.

A collection was made at his funeral for the mental health charity Devon MIND and further donations can be made at a dedicated Just Giving web page, by going to the Just Giving website and searching for Jonny Kirkham.

Dan lived most of his life in Nymet Rowland, growing up in the village and attending Lapford Primary School, followed by Queen Elizabeth's School, Crediton, and then spending four years at Imperial College, London, where he achieved a first class honours masters degree in Maths and Computer Science.

Those who knew him will remember him as a quiet, shy and gentle person, highly intelligent and with a very good sense of humour, but someone who could never shake off the burden of depression constantly weighing him down.



Although we are devastated by his death, we console ourselves with the thought that he is at last at peace.

Fruit to half fill pie dish [cooking apples or fruit such as plums/ rhubarb from freezer]

For topping:

100g (4oz) butter

100g (4oz) caster sugar

finely grated zest of a small Seville orange

two lightly whisked eggs

100g (4oz) self-raising flour


2 tablespoons milk.

Cream together butter, caster sugar and orange zest until light and fluffy. Add eggs gradually and fold in flour. Spoon over the top of the fruit and bake in a moderate oven for about 35 - 40 minutes until the sponge is well risen and golden brown. Serve with vanilla custard, or cream.

AN EVENING WITH KATIE TURLEY, NOT JUST A FLORIST!

In November on one of the first cold nights of this winter we met the florist Katie Turley in The ARK. For many years this happy lady worked as a Florist in York, and by the end of the evening it was apparent how skilful Katie is with foliage and flowers.

On our arrival Katie had a table full of floral creations to show us what we may be able to put together after this demonstration. These included table decorations put in those large candle glasses (after the candle has finished), small floral adornments to attach to wine bottles, added to gift boxes and larger table displays, including your candelabra! Pieces of living art that will last over weeks.

Items that would help you put everything together would be: pine cones (sprayed or not with gold), florist's wire, and the old staple oasis, which may be replaced for a more eco-friendly or compostable alternative in future. Katie added candles to the arrangements but emphasised these are a fire hazard. The trick to avoid the candles falling over is to use wooden cocktail sticks secured with heavy duty black tape to the end of the candles before putting them into the oasis. Still it is very important never to leave lighted candles unattended.

While artistically putting together a 2ft / 60cms long table display Katie entertained us with stories of incidents in her florist's shop, I'm sure she has enough to write a TV series! This particular time the florist's had a delivery of boxed orchids from Holland. When unpacking these she came across a large cube of some 'substance' that she felt was highly suspicious. Not knowing what to do she quickly hid the cube on a shelf out of sight, hoping the police would not call in. When a friend came in she cautiously asked him what it was. He cheerfully said it was silica gel to keep the moisture out to protect the orchids. Phew! During the telling of the story, pieces of assorted evergreens, a flower, or a pine cone were added to complete the large centrepiece.

The greenery, all of which we can find in our or a friend's garden, were the supporting act to several beautiful roses, a few carnations and a little gypsophila.

Then Katie skilfully showed us how to make a small simple collection of flowers into a bouquet that would easily compete with any florist delivery service. Oh, then we were shown how to make a ribbon bow, it looked easy but difficult, if you know what I mean. A busy evening that introduced us to a new craft.



FAMILY LIFE BY AKHIL SHARMA

On the front cover, this small book promised so much. It was on the Folio Prize Short List, one of the top 10 novels of the New York Times and showered with praise like: 'wonderful' and 'outstanding'. Perhaps the copy that I held had the cover put on the wrong book!

It started off in Delhi during the late 1970s, describing the comfortable routine for 8 year old Ajay and his older brother, Birju. Life changes when their father gets a job in America and a year later the family join him. Suddenly, they are in a world of television, hot running water and carpets. The brothers start school to continue their education, there they have to put up with the spiteful, petty bullying treatment from some of the American children. Ajay, especially, finds this very hard to cope with. Birju studies hard to get a scholarship to the Bronx High School of Science and, to the joy of the whole family, he passes. The boys spend the summer vacation in Arlington with their Aunt and it is while they are there that Birju has a terrible accident diving into a swimming pool. He is found after being unconscious on the bottom for three minutes, by which time he has suffered massive brain damage.



The rest of the book tells of the family's struggle to care for their son, there is always a either his mother or father by his side and Ajay joins them when school is over. When Birju leaves hospital, he goes to a care home but his parents are not happy with the care he gets and he is moved to the family home so they can look after him themselves. Unfortunately, I found the rest of the book very depressing, even the other Indian émigrés seemed to only visit for their own benefit. Years pass and Ajay goes to university and ends up as a Merchant Banker in New York. He is able to send his parents enough money to employ 24 hour care for Birju, so, slowly over many years you read of their life improving (but by then, I really didn't care).

Moral – don't believe all the praise you read on a book cover. The only way to know if it is really worth reading is to give it a go. I am afraid I was the only member of the book club to actually manage to finish this book.



BOOK REVIEW: THE PERIPHERAL

Ah, 2022. The year of George Jetson's birth, which will make those of us of a certain vintage feel old. It's also forty years since an American science fiction writer called William Gibson needed a term for a fourth-dimension created by a network of computers and called it "Cyberspace". It'll never catch on.

His work has been eulogised, derided and "paid homage to" over four decades (I'm looking in your direction *The Matrix* and *Inception*). His books are epically cool, a Kubrickian remove from their narrative, but with a real moral purpose and chapters like hot shots of espresso.

Later this year, we'll see an Amazon Prime series of his 2014 novel *The Peripheral*. Adaptations of his works are rare, but look elsewhere on everyone's favourite parcel delivery service for the teeth-grindingly awful *Johnny Mnemonic*. *The Peripheral* is perhaps the most accessible of his books, but it appears to have acquired a curiously timely status. It's a novel across two time zones: a pre-apocalyptic mid- 2020's, before an event called "The Jackpot" wipes out 80% of humanity: a tsunami of war, political instabilities, global warming and pandemics. I know, sounds far-fetched.



The other is a mid-23rd century, where science has thankfully solved all of our problems. London is ruled by a monarchy, but in reality, AI makes the big decisions and Russian gangsters have the money. Thankfully, there is a something to take your mind off things. There's a Victorian cosplay zone with both robot street urchins and prostitution. If that's not your bag, Time Travel (called Continua) is possible by the manipulation of data, creating an alternate reality called a "stub".

Video games tester Flynne Fisher sees a murder in a game which, in reality takes place some two centuries hence. Fixer Wilf Netherton becomes involved in a plot to manipulate the past, to suit the needs of a greedy future. Like most of his oeuvre, it's a caper with the eponymous McGuffin. Here: a robot, which can house the consciousness of a living being. It's involving, imaginative and slick piece of work. Most of Gibson's books come in trilogies, *Agency* is set in the same universe - with a Continua enthusiast called Vespasian creating a world on the brink of nuclear war. The finally book in this trilogy is, as yet unwritten.

And so, later this year we'll see a much-delayed series of *The Peripheral*. Some eight years after the publication of the novel, not helped by a mid-production shutdown due to Covid. This is a level of irony that even Alanis Morrisette would shy away from. Production finished in November. No trailers, no photos, but an IMDB listing with actors. Yes, it actually exists.

Hopefully, this will lead to his work receiving more praise and more curious readers. Go to BBC Sounds to hear him on *Desert Island Discs*, or discussing his debut *Neuromancer* on *World Book Club*. His elongated drawl of a voice has addictive, mesmerising qualities. He is a prime example of a novelist as both a visionary and an idealist; who sees technology as both saviour and satan. To quote him nineteen years ago, "The future is here. It's just not widely distributed yet."





THE FARMING YEAR - WINTER

The start of a new year might bring a couple of days respite for many of us, but it's still busy for our Devon farmers. On farms with livestock, calves may be weaned towards the end of the month onto concentrates or beet ration, while a flock of sheep may be fed beet or sheep nuts daily. They are sometimes fed hay if the conditions are frosty or snowy. Many sheep farmers will be lambing right throughout the winter period so, depending on the weather, the ewes and lambs may well need to be kept indoors for a time. On warmer days and as the days lengthen, there should be signs of new grass growth, which will greatly benefit ewes with their lambs. On some dairy farms calving really gets underway throughout March, and



it's the busiest time of the year for many farmers. It's not just the cows though; lambing time continues too. The ewes and lambs often need round-the-clock attention, so farmers can expect a number of sleepless nights for a couple of months. Ewes will have been sorted into lambing groups, based on the number of lambs expected. They will have been vaccinated, and their feet are trimmed to guard against foot rot. Lambs usually will have their tails docked when a day or two old by the application of a small rubber ring. This will prevent the future attraction of flies to the nether regions as the lambs grow older. Ram lambs may also be castrated at a similar age by the same means. Other routine jobs will also normally take place at this time, such as dosing the ewes and calves with worm drench and the application of identification ear tags (a legal requirement).

It's also a time for general farm maintenance, which might include repairs, painting, cleaning and ensuring that machinery works as it should.

There's always things that need to be done on a farm, but February can be less busy than the months to come. The maintenance and upkeep continues, and livestock will keep being fed indoors when the weather is bad instead of grazing.

Slurry and muck spreading can commence as from 1st February, and if the ground is frozen, so much the better as the ground will not become so rutted by the seemingly increasingly heavy machinery. Slurry will be spread a lot more as the weather starts to improve, and temperatures hopefully aren't quite as cold as they might have been through December and January. Towards the end of the month, for many it's the start of the calving season, so February is sort of the calm before the storm.

Spring barley may be sewn whenever the weather and soil conditions are right, up to the end of March. Winter wheat and other autumn sown crops may need to be sprayed with a fungicide when the weather allows.

CPR DANGER, RESPONSE, SHOUT FOR HELP AIRWAY, BREATHING, CPR

Information and guidance about hands-only cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and CPR with rescue breaths.

Hands-only CPR

To carry out a chest compression:

1. Place the heel of your hand on the breastbone at the centre of the person's chest. Place your other hand on top of your first hand and interlock your fingers.

- 2. Position yourself with your shoulders above your hands.
- 3.Using your body weight (not just your arms), press straight down by 5-6cm (2-2.5 inches) on the patients chest.
- 4. Keeping your hands on the chest, release the compression and allow the chest to return to its original position.
- 5.Repeat these compressions at a rate of 100 to 120 times per minute until an ambulance arrives or you become exhausted.

When you call for an ambulance, telephone systems now exist that can give basic life-saving instructions, including advice about CPR. These are now common and are easily accessible with mobile phones.

CPR with rescue breaths (No breaths at moment due to Covid) If you've been trained in CPR, including rescue breaths, and feel confident using your skills, you should give chest compressions with rescue breaths. If you're not completely confident, attempt hands-only CPR instead (see above).

Adults

1.Place the heel of your hand on the centre of the person's chest, then place the other hand on top and press down by 5-6cm (2-2.5 inches) at a steady rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute.

2. After every 30 chest compressions, give two rescue breaths.
3. Tilt the casualty's head gently and lift the chin up with two fingers. Pinch the person's nose. Seal your mouth over their mouth and blow steadily and firmly into their mouth for about

one second. Check that their chest rises. Give two rescue breaths.

4.Continue with cycles of 30 chest compressions and two rescue breaths until they begin to recover or emergency help arrives.

Children over one year old

1.Open the child's airway by placing one hand on the child's forehead and gently tilting their head back and lifting the chin. Remove any visible obstructions from the mouth and nose.

2.Pinch their nose. Seal your mouth over their mouth and blow steadily and firmly into their mouth, checking that their chest rises. Give five initial rescue breaths.

3.Place the heel of one hand on the centre of their chest and push down by 5cm (about two inches), which is approximately one-third of the chest diameter. The quality (depth) of chest compressions is very important. Use two hands if you can't achieve a depth of 5cm using one hand.

4. After every 30 chest compressions at a rate of 100 to 120 per minute, give two breaths.

5. Continue with cycles of 30 chest compressions and two rescue breaths until they begin to recover or emergency help arrives.

Infants under one year old

1.Open the infant's airway by placing one hand on their forehead and gently tilting the head back and lifting the chin. Remove any visible obstructions from the mouth and nose.

2.Place your mouth over the mouth and nose of the infant and blow steadily and gently into their mouth, checking that their chest rises. Give five initial rescue breaths.

3.Place two fingers in the middle of the chest and push down by 4cm (about 1.5 inches), which is approximately one-third of the chest diameter. The quality (depth) of chest compressions is very important. Use the heel of one hand if you can't achieve a depth of 4cm using the tips of two fingers.

4.After 30 chest compressions at a rate of 100 to 120 per minute, give two rescue breaths.

5. Continue with cycles of 30 chest compressions and two rescue breaths until they begin to recover or emergency help arrives.


