REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY AND DAY NOVEMBER 2020

After remembering all the Armed Forces since 1914 – 1918 onwards until now, please remember the 2.5 million National Service people who were called up for service from 1945 to 1960. The Forgotten Army. They served in Korea; Hong Kong; Malaya; Kenya; Cyprus; Gibraltar; Malta; Aden; Egypt; Germany and Great Britain and other countries of the world. Having been born in Nymet Rowland in 1933, I was called up on 18th October 1951. I was put in the Infantry, the First Battalion Wiltshire Regiment, training for an extra ten weeks after 6 weeks basic training for Korea. I spent eight weeks in Topsham Barracks and on Woodbury Common. Whilst in Topsham Barracks King George VI died, thus I served under two monarchs.

On Remembrance Day every year my thoughts return to 1953 in Hong Kong, when our mate in the Signals Platoon passed away and all those who volunteered to join the Commonwealth Brigade in Korea and never returned home. So please, please remember them all at Remembrancetide. God bless you all.

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Lapford Weather Review



Average temperature, but on the dry side.

The warmest day was the 14th with a maximum of 24.8°C and the coolest was the 26th with a maximum of 12.7°C. The coolest night was on the 28th with a minimum of 5.0°C, and a ground frost of -1.4°C.

Rainfall was less than half the month's average, with a total of 30.7 mm., most of which fell in the last week. The wettest day was the 30th with 11.4 mm. The last really dry September was in 2014.

The windiest day was the 25th with a gust of 34 m.p.h.

WILD LAPFORD



Hibernation – more than just a long sleep.

Mid November usually heralds the beginning of hibernation for some smaller mammals as well as amphibians, reptiles and insects. The precise start of hibernation varies depending on the temperature. In warm years, hibernation may not start until December. Similarly, the end of hibernation is dependent on the weather and can be February or March.

Why do mammals hibernate? Smaller mammals lose heat much more quickly than larger ones and so they must burn their fat fast to keep warm in cold weather. However, for those mammals which rely mainly on invertebrates for their food, these fat reserves can't be topped up because invertebrates are particularly difficult to find during cold weather. The only way these mammals can make their accumulated fat reserves sustain them through

the winter is to slow their body metabolism to almost a standstill – they do this by hibernating.

What is hibernation? It is more than a deep sleep. A hibernating animal's metabolism slows drastically to minimise the amount of energy (fat) it is using. The hibernating mammal's body temperature drops to well below the normal 37 degrees Celsius (so it feels very cold to the touch). The heart rate slows to as little as three or four beats per minute in hedgehogs, but in bats, the heart rate can fall from the waking 400 beats per minute to just 11 beats. The breathing rate also slows to about once every two minutes. The hibernating mammal can have the appearance of being dead!

Which animals hibernate? The hedgehog is perhaps the most well-known hibernator in Britain. It fattens up in the autumn, and spends the cold months curled up in a cosy nest. Bats, which feed entirely on insects, also hibernate, wrapped in their wings deep in a cave, tree or attic somewhere. Hedgehogs and bats do not stay asleep for the whole winter. They will wake up on warmer days and look for food or water. If their temperature drops too low, they will also wake up and start shivering in order to keep the body temperature above freezing. Physical disturbance will also awake a hibernating hedgehog or bat. Every time they wake up a great deal of energy is used up, so a long, cold winter is better for these animals than a winter with lots of warm spells. Not all small mammals hibernate, those that have a food source that is easier to find, such as field mice, squirrels and voles will shelter in nests during the cold periods to conserve energy, but emerge to find food regularly throughout the winter. Some of the other hibernating animals include fish, frogs and newts, which have no way to keep warm during winter but their blood contains an anti-freeze substance that stops them from freezing. They shelter under logs, rocks and fallen leaves in the water. When the weather gets cold, they move down to the bottom of lakes and ponds and some even burrow into the mud. Reptiles and some insects also hibernate and to keep warm they find holes in the ground, under rocks or in rotting logs.

How can I help a hibernating hedgehog? If you usually put food and water out for hedgehogs, continue to do so. If they wake up, they will be hungry and thirsty. Our Guy Fawkes celebrations can be bad news for hedgehogs as they often make nests in bonfires so it's important to not make your bonfire in advance of lighting it or if you do, move the bonfire pile before lighting it. Dry leaves and grass are the hedgehogs preferred nesting material so don't be too tidy in the garden, sweep fallen leaves onto flowerbeds and if you have space, leave "wild" areas in your garden for them.

In order to survive hibernation, a young hedgehog should weigh at least 450 grams, if you find a hog weighing less than this during winter months, contact the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890 801 or see their website for advice. <u>https://www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk/</u> For photos and videos of the local flora and fauna search for "Wild Lapford" on Facebook and join the group for regular updates.

MY FATHER'S WAR

For most of his life my father would not discuss his wartime experiences, but towards the end of his life he was persuaded to recount some of his memories.



In the summer of 1929, at the age of 17, my father joined the army. On 17th August 1929 he reported to the Royal Artillery depot at Woolwich. He was appointed to the rank of gunner and began three months recruitment training. When this was successfully completed he was transferred to the Royal Artillery barracks at Plymouth Citadel to wait for a posting. He embarked for Hong Kong in September 1930 without taking any home leave, and he remained there at Lyemun Barracks for the next three and a half years. During his time in Hong Kong he gained several qualifications, including those of Marksman and Marksman first class, Lewis Gunner, CD Layer and two re-qualifications, and the Artillery's second class education certificate. He explained that a CD Layer is the man who lines up the guns to the target and that CD related to coastal defences.

Following this overseas posting he should have had home leave. He was, however, sent to Malta, again without taking any home leave, in 1934. In Malta he re-qualified as a CD Layer. He returned to England in 1936 and was released almost seven years after enlisting and having been away from England for five and a half years.

It was not long before his adventurous tendencies took him to London, where he joined the London Salvage Corps at the Elephant and Castle. My mother joined him in London and they married at Southwark Register Office in November 1937.

In 1939, when it became obvious that war was imminent, my father volunteered to re-join the Royal Artillery, knowing that as a reservist he would be called up anyway. He delayed reporting to the Artillery's Ascot reception centre until my mother, who was expecting my sister, was safely back in Devon.

His first posting was to France, but he was soon home for Christmas. When the war began in earnest, his regiment was sent to Waterloo in Belgium, and from there to Arras, the sight of one of the First World War battles. He recalled the horror of digging up bones and pieces of equipment when they were setting up camp. The hedges and walls had also been constructed from First World War debris. He described this as being one of the most upsetting experiences of his life.

The role of the Royal Artillery at Arras was the defence of the town and prevention of the German advance. This proved unsuccessful and his Unit moved out. The withdrawal seems to have been rather chaotic as my father and two colleagues were left behind with the tanks of the Armoured Division. They were ordered to carry out forward observation for that Division, armed with only rifles.

They eventually discovered that their own Unit had gone to Dunkirk and were permitted to follow with a Bren Carrier. There was so much traffic and so many men on the road, all heading towards Dunkirk, that they abandoned the Bren Carrier by rolling it down a hill and setting fire to it so that it could not be used by Germans. Shortly after they found a riderless horse and rode that for a while. On the way to Dunkirk my father had picked up a discarded rifle but hadn't bothered to check if it was loaded. When he jumped down from the horse he dropped the rifle, which of course went off. Luckily he only burnt his hair!

When they reached the Dunkirk beaches the three set out to try to find their unit. They were on the beach at De Panne just north of Dunkirk in the dark when they heard someone on horseback calling out the number of their Unit. Unfortunately the officer was looking for his own men and told my father and his colleagues that there was no room for them on the boat. This was the only time they had any word of their Unit and they discovered that the rest of the men had already gone. By this time they were becoming desperate as there were fewer and fewer boats coming in and those were being commandeered by senior officers for their own men. They were not permitted to board any of these boats. They were pacing up and down the water's edge praying that another boat would arrive when salvation came. A Naval Pinnace came in with a rope hanging over the side. When an officer shouted at one of the ratings to bring the rope in my father and his colleagues grabbed it and were hauled on board. They were taken out to a fishing trawler which was already carrying hundreds of troops, but space was made for them. The boat landed in Ramsgate where all the men boarded a waiting train although none had any idea where they were being taken. They ended up in Cardiff and after a week were all given passes and allowed to go home. Whilst on leave my father was ill and was taken into hospital, probably because he had eaten virtually nothing since leaving Arras. Recovery took two or three weeks, following which he was told to re-join his unit at Melton Mowbray. However, when he got there he was told they were all on home leave so he was given a further two-week pass.

By the time he had finished this extended period of leave his unit had moved to Melksham. On his return they were split into small Units to guard the English coast, and he was sent to Thorney Island. He was then recalled to Aldershot where the Unit was reequipped with new guns and vehicles, and from there sent to Savernake from where they were sent to guard the south coast against the expected invasion.


In September 1940 the London Blitz was overwhelming the Fire Service to such an extent that experienced men from the Armed Forces were requested to assist. As he had previously been in the London Salvage Corps my father volunteered and he was seconded until 1942.

The next time he went overseas was as part of the D-Day landings on 6th June 1944. He was in the Guards Armoured Division which was part of the British Second Army commanded by Lieutenant-General MC Dempsey. His memory was rather sketchy when recounting this, but he remembers the first advance towards Bayeux which was to become the main supply and medical centre for the Second Army. The Germans retreated from Bayeux without too much serious fighting. The next objective of the Second Army was to secure the land to the south and south-west of Caen. The Germans fought hard to keep the city and there were difficult battles during June and early July with a great deal of damage to the city. The city was taken by the Allies at the beginning of July 1944. The Second Amy then proceeded towards

Belgium and then through Holland to Germany. He could remember being in Hamelin, which he described as a very peaceful town.

He took part in Operation Market Garden, where the plan was to secure the six bridges leading to Germany. A British force was then to speed through the last bridge at Arnhem, reach the Ruhr area, and crush the already damaged factories of the German war effort. The operation was a total disaster because of bad weather and poor judgement. My father described it as a total fiasco.

In early May 1945 the Second Army completed its advance at the Kiel Canal and the troops were brought home. He was demobilised in October 1945.

For those who don't already know me, my name is Karen Burrows. In early December 2019 I started to feel really unwell and was admitted to hospital. Nothing could have prepared me or my family for the diagnosis I was given. I had Stage 4 Ovarian Cancer with spikes of Cancer on my lungs and liver. We were devastated.

Gruelling chemotherapy followed. I lost all my hair, including eyebrows and eyelashes which really hurt as I never went out without my mascara. I suffered a lot of infections and needed four blood transfusions and a magnesium transfusion before I started to feel better.

Then it hit. Covid 19. I had to isolate and cut myself off from the world, my family and friends, the things that gave me comfort and support. Just as I was at my lowest, I was introduced to FORCE. They offered counsellors who could support me, mindfulness training, zoom exercise classes which I attend twice a week, and I love the online art groups. They offer support, encouragement and guidance in so many different ways. I changed my diet, practice Qu Gong twice daily, and meditate to help keep me grounded.

My chemotherapy has finished and I am on a maintenance dose now. My cancer is incurable but I have taken control. Thanks to this amazing charity, I have my life back. RAIL NEWS

It is one of the great mysteries of life that, for generations, railway managers have looked at the level of usage (passenger numbers) on trains to determine whether to improve services or reduce services where trains are not being used. The logic seems to miss the 'chicken and egg' point that, until you run the service you cannot determine how many people are using it!

Anyway, that is a rather long-winded introduction to say that GWR are now looking at passenger numbers at Lapford to inform their decision-making on whether to add even more trains to the

Lapford timetable following the first steps to improve services taken last July as reported in the September Lapford Lookout. So, the message is simple: please use the train as much as you can particularly over the next few months. In the meantime, we are pressing for the first morning train to be stopped here enabling access to Exeter before 8 o'clock in the morning, and to get more stops on the Saturday services to bring them into line with the weekday and Sunday services. Crucially, we should realise the potential for shopping and leisure trips to Barnstaple and Exeter which were never previously feasible under the old timetable.

At the same time the Parish Council is liaising with the railway authorities to look at creating a safer walking route from the village to the station. More information on this will be shared through The Lapford Lookout, as it becomes available.

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HOLD - AUTUMN 2020 UPDATE



The Annual Report and Accounts to 30th April 2020 are below

David Bragg stood down as Chairman effective from 30th April 2020, and Peter Norman has been elected by the Directors in his place. We cannot adequately express our gratitude to David for his tremendous energy, skills, and leadership through often difficult times. We are delighted that he has agreed to continue as a Director.

As it has been decided to postpone the AGM, Board of Directors will remain as currently constituted until such time as nominations and elections can be held in the normal way.

The best news of all is that the two loans showing on the Balance Sheet as of 30th April 2020 are now being cleared. The private loan (£25,000) has been very generously converted to a donation and the £35,000 owed to St Thomas' PCC should be repaid within the next few weeks, when we receive the grant from Lapford Parish Council. **This will mean that HOLD is then free of debt**.

The Directors are actively engaging with the Church Green Trustees to assist the repair of the bank to the Church Green, and with several volunteers who are keen to enhance the site with planting and wildlife habitats.

However, the weather has not been kind, and although we are working to have Lower Town Place open to the public before the end of October that will depend on the 'take' of the final delivery of turf.

The Directors wish you all the best of health in the current pandemic and we look forward to the whole community being able to enjoy the new open space.

Chair's Report to 30th April 2020

After the excitement of the successful procurement of Lower Town Place in the last financial year this has been a roller coaster year of moving on its development to become a public space for the benefit of all the community.

At the same time as getting quotes for demolition of all the farm buildings and restoration of the area ready for grass turfing, fencing and generally creating a safe area for community enjoyment, we were working to assimilate feedback from diverse sections of the community, and try to address their concerns. HOLD was well supported by H4L through this process and we continued to move the process forward.

All quotes were approved and then commissioned by the Parish Council as required for payment through the Parish Council's loan from the Public Works Loan Board.

With all that in place work started in January with the demolition of the steel frame agricultural building and removal of all roofs on the traditional buildings using a contractor with all the necessary health and safety certification for safe disposal of any asbestos containing materials.

This was followed by a tree specialist removing all the overgrown ash and sycamore to make safe the area from storm damage and open up the views to the Church. Finally the walls of the traditional buildings were demolished, and all building stone removed from site for storage pending possible re-use in future developments.

The Covid-19 crisis then brought a stop to proceedings for the duration of the full lockdown period which extended beyond the end of the year that this report refers to.

Significant progress therefore was made in the year towards making the whole site safe but not yet ready for public use. All being well 2020/2021 should be the year in which the site will finally be made available to the community.

Grateful thanks go to all HOLD Directors for their patience and persistence and to those from our farming community who voluntarily assisted with the transport of materials off site for storage.

LOWER TOWN PLACE UPDATE – FLORA AND FAUNA

Hopefully, after many delays, all the turf will have been laid and the grass will be establishing.

Wild flower seeds are being sown on some of the fringe areas – along the back of the Orchard Way houses and garages, along the bank round the churchyard and in the area adjoining the Church Green bank.



The idea will be to not only enhance the area with a colourful display in future years, but to also benefit pollinating insects and thus enhance the biodiversity of the whole site. These wild flower areas will then be managed in a wildlife friendly way, which usually means just cutting back once a year in the late summer, once seeds have set.

Some spring flowering native bulbs are also being planted on the churchyard bank, thanks to an embryonic team of volunteers. If anyone else would be interested in lending a hand then do please get in touch (<u>amepstein55@gmail.com</u>). It is also planned to install some nest boxes this winter. Any other ideas to enhance the site for the benefit of wildlife are always welcome. (The planting of hedges and/or trees are just some of the things that will be open for discussion in the coming months and years).

LEAPing IN TO ACTION!

On behalf of the village, the Parish Council would like to extend gratitude to all the volunteers who have been working so diligently under the Lapford Emergency Response Team (LERT) to ensure the more vulnerable villagers have been able to access deliveries of essential groceries and prescriptions.

With the first job being served on the 21st of March, Lapford is amongst the first villages to have an operational system in place! Not just a simple errands service, but with a fully riskassessed and insured set of printed procedures for signed-up volunteers operating with PPE and every job logged and managed under GDPR!

To the end of September, the LERT team have served 357 jobs including 121 prescription collections and even 2 pets safely exercised for owners who needed to isolate!

The bulk of the jobs came in between March and May, with the busiest month of April serving 106 jobs alone and remained high through the summer. We saw a reduction in the need from August, with August and September serving around 20% of the levels we saw back in April.

It should be further noted that a significant debt of gratitude is also owed to the **Lapford Cross Spar shop and staff** who, not only applied the control measures promptly, but have also modified their procedures in order to allow isolating residents to pay remotely as the LERT team collect these essential groceries.

Now, as we stand on the edge of winter and the expectation of an increase in Covid and the ensuing lockdown measures that may follow, we feel ready to take on the challenge!






We read a wide range of literature; literary fiction, crime fiction, translated fiction, some popular fiction, short stories, biographies, autobiographies and other non-fiction.

MORE ABOUT HEDGEHOGS

Further to last month's Wild Lapford article about hedgehogs, please note that when finding a orphaned, injured or sick hedgehog speed is essential in getting it to a carer. Don't put it in a box and wait until the next day to



make contact with a career. BHPS has a list of carers in the UK. Alternatively contact your local carer, John Groves, on 01363 866564 or 07966 435147. John has kindly submitted the following information which will also be relevant in November if the mild weather continues.

Hedgehogs in October by Kay Bullen, Trustee, British Hedgehog Preservation Society

Now is the time when hedgehogs will be concentrating on putting on weight for hibernation. As the weather gets colder so their natural food is harder to find. However if they are underweight but healthy in October they can still stay in the wild provided they are given a plentiful supply of food.

Check out the British Hedgehog Preservation Society's website: <u>www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk</u> for a feeding station that is easy to make. There is also a leaflet on Autumn Juveniles suggesting when they might be left in the wild and whether or when they need to be rescued at this time of year.

Do take care when clearing away autumn leaves and if you are making a bonfire in advance do check it for sleepy hedgehogs before lighting it or better still move the pile to a new site just before you start to burn it. Finally, always light from one side to allow an escape route for anything you may have missed. If you have an out of the way corner in the garden, then an undisturbed pile of leaves etc would make a great place for a hedgehog to hibernate.

Our native hedgehogs are now officially vulnerable to extinction according to new research. The UK Red List conservation report, which was conducted by the Mammal Society, suggests that our hedgehogs could be at risk of dying out completely if we don't act to help them. Do your bit by helping any visiting hedgehogs to survive the winter and perhaps they will also raise a family in your garden next year.
