

In the last Lookout it was stated that a Faculty had been granted for these works. It now transpires that the PCC had been misinformed by the Architect and that this is still 'work in progress'.



LAPFORD WEATHER MARCH 2021

Average temperature, but less rain.

The mildest day was the 30th with a maximum of 18.9°C. This was not our warmest March day - that was back in 2012, when the thermometer rose to 20.0°C.

The coolest day was the 7^{th} with a maximum of 5.4° C. The coldest night was also on the 7th with a minimum of -4.1° C and the grass thermometer fell to -8.7° C.

Total rainfall for the month was 47.7 mm, about 70% of average. The wettest day was the 11th with 13.0 mm.

The windiest day was the 10th with a very strong gust of 59 m.p.h.



LOWER TOWN PLACE - MAY 2021

April saw the completion of the hedging and works to the boundary. Events are being planned for joint use of the Hall and Lower Town Place. The first of these is the Lapford ReStart event being worked on now with a proposed date of Saturday July 10th.

To ensure the safe and secure use of the grounds by children, young people and the community, it is with regret a decision has been taken not to allow dogs on Lower Town Place. This will take effect from Monday 10th May, Public Notices will be put in place and if necessary gates will be installed.

WILD LAPFORD—HEDGEHOGS IN MAY



Spring is now in full stride, with the verges full of cow parsley and buttercups. Skylarks, blackbirds and song thrushes dominate the dawn chorus with wrens and warblers joining in later in the month.

By now, most hedgehogs should have replaced the weight lost during hibernation and be on the lookout for a mate. Mating season started in April and continues to September, but the main frenzy of activity, "the rut" is in May.

When the male finds a female on heat, in his attempt to impress her, a noisy dance ensues. The male repeatedly circles the female snorting, huffing and grunting. This is usually met, initially at least, with the cold shoulder where the female "frowns" raising her spines to protect her face and moves her flank to face him. All the kerfuffle can attract the attention of rival males who will aggressively barge and shove each other out the way, the less dominant male will usually curl up in a tight ball or run away. This is all part of the dominant male's attempt to win the approval of the female. If she accepts his advances, she will change her posture and flatten her 5000 spines allowing the male to mount her without impaling himself. The act is very brief and there is no time for any pillow talk as the

pair go their separate ways immediately. Hogs are promiscuous creatures and will mate with multiple partners in one night, never mind in one season!

The pregnant female hog makes a substantial nursery nest to give birth to usually three or four, but sometimes as many as five tiny blind hoglets around 34 days after a successful mating. These pale hoglets have about 100 white spines and are completely dependent on their mother's milk for the first three weeks when they start to eat food chewed up by the mother. About this time their eyes will open and the white spines will be gradually replaced by the characteristic brown spines. The mother can sometimes be seen carrying hoglets from nest to nest if she gets disturbed. This is one of the few occasions it is normal to see a hedgehog in daylight. By five weeks old the hoglets will be out foraging for food with their mum and at about six weeks the hoglet will wander off to live independently. The hoglets father plays no part at all in their upbringing.

Watch out there's a hog about! Please always take extra care to check long grass and overgrown areas before you usea strimmer as hogs love to build nests in areas like this and strimmers can cause hogs catastrophic injuries.

Lapford Hedgehog Highway project is gaining interest with several reports of both hog sightings and hog scat around the village. We'd love to hear from you:

Have you seen any hedgehogs?

Have you seen any hedgehog scat (poo)?

Do you leave food out for hedgehogs?

Do you have a hedgehog nest box?

Do you have easy access between your garden and your neighbours (either hole in fence or a hedge)?



READER BOOK REVIEW: A GAME OF BIRDS AND WOLVES BY SIMON PARKIN

A minor country faces a major crisis. A nation is saved, due to the ingenuity and courage of ordinary people. Sounds like recent history? Think again. The Battle Of The Atlantic took place nearly eighty years ago. Perhaps it's a forgotten battle, but there is a stark fact that underlies it. The German Navy was



sinking Allied shipping to such a degree; Britain was 2-3 months away from starvation and surrender.

The fate of a nation rests on a handful of Scouse WRENs, wargaming the battles on the floor of The Western Approaches using matchboxes, string and cotton wool. Their opponent is Karl Doenitz, Commander of The Kriegsmarine. He is determined to use U-Boats in the same way he sees wolves hunting in the forests around Berlin.

It's a remarkable story and Parkin writes with both enthusiasm and compassion. It could be a dry factual tale, but we are have love (often thwarted by war and outdated morality) on The British side. On the German side, soldiers who see a U-Boat as an easy posting; but have a life expectancy of fifty days.

The book was written as an untold story and in that sense, it remains so. It's not a best seller. 'The Game' features in Nicolas Monserrat's novel The Cruel Sea, but was cut from the film. The last of the WREN's died in 2018. Gilbert Roberts, the programmes commander ended his life as a Constable in Dartmoor.

With the film rights bought by Steven Spielberg, this game will finally see an audience. This is a book where truth is stranger than fiction and where great battles are won by small moves.



This month's book was by Daphne du Maurier, 'Don't Look Now' and four other short stories.

Daphne du Maurier was born in London in 1907 where she spent her childhood. She was surrounded by actors and journalists in her family so it wouldn't have come to any one's surprise that she



should become an author. Her most famous books include Rebecca, Frenchman's Creek, Jamaica Inn and My Cousin Rachel. All of these have been made into films several times and all are rather 'dark' as were the stories in this book. I remember seeing the film Don't Look Now with Donald Sutherland many years ago and being rather scared!! She moved to Cornwall and died in Fowey in 1989.

MORE FROM THE ADVENTURE GROUP OF GAMERS

This month's game suggestion is somewhat ironic, as we have all spent so much time locked in our houses recently, so maybe this game is also a symbol of freedom to come.

If you haven't heard of escape rooms you are missing an exciting day out, if you are a gamer and puzzle solver that is. In the real world a good escape room is a themed theatrical set that a group of six to 8 people enter and then need to solve puzzles to find their way out. Themes include escaping from a long lost temple or breaking into and out of a bank, either way they are totally immersive and a great way to spend an hour.

Given the current restrictions a good alternative to the real thing is **EXIT – An Escape room in a box.**

This game mimics a traditional escape room scenario but using cards and other secret props in a box. The game will usually start with one easy puzzle but in completing that puzzle you are then given further puzzles or props in card format. Inventively these are sometimes folded, cut or stuck together to reveal a three-digit code, which will then lead you to an answer card. Cleverly the game has the ability to provide clues so if you really get stuck you can get some hints without ruining the game. A game will take between 1 to 2 hours so it provides an evening of entertainment.

To play over Zoom with friends you simply need to buy two copies of the game so there are cards at each location and then set up your Zoom call and start playing. The EXIT series of games also include a timer app so you can keep track of

how long it takes you to escape and there are lots of different themes to choose from; The Haunted Rollercoaster, The Pharaoh's Tomb, the Secret Lab to name a few. It was a pleasant and fun way to spend a Saturday evening. Note: these games can only be used once, but you can pass them on to friends.

It's peculiar that abbreviation is such a long word, and phonetically isn't spelt phonetically at all!




