Time to Tell

RDS signals, digital displays; alarms and beeps that don't go away. Whether we want it, whether we care, the time of day is everywhere!

Time has been tamed, we now have its measure. But remember the time, when we still knew the pleasure

...of telling time?



In 1909, the 80th birthday of Lapford's long serving and much loved rector, Cornelius Wilson, was celebrated in some style. The village was decorated with flags and laurel; the bells rang throughout the day; there was music, dancing, fireworks and a sit down meal attended by 300-400 people (a number greater than the village population).

Why such an outpouring of affection?

When Rev Wilson arrived in Lapford, the village was still reeling from the legacy of the notorious, thuggish (and probably murderous) "Parson Jack". The village was scarred: it had harboured secrets; fear and mistrust had run deep. For 33 years, Rev Wilson had been committed to healing old wounds through pastoral care. As The Western Times put it:

"you could never know what were the deeper thoughts working in the minds of the parishioners. It required one who lived among them to know what they were"

As the Rector had helped bring together a divided community it seemed fitting that it should be marked with something to benefit the whole community: a village clock

A Village Clock or a Church Clock?

The clock was a large expense for a village of just 280 adults. The list of donors included 250 names ... so it was a real village effort!

Around a half of the families in the village belonged to Lapford's Non-Conformist Church, so it was important that the clock became a village, not a church, asset.

The fact that many Nonconformists as well as Church parishioners contributed is significant of the good feeling existing among the people of Laptord.

To this day it remains a 'village clock' managed by the Parish Council.

This is not particularly unusual. Many civic clocks were put in churches out of convenience, rather than pay expense of a purpose-built clock tower, However, for councils today it creates a dilemma as the cost of preserving heritage clocks has to be balanced with other needs. Town and Parish Councils need to know that residents still care about their clocks if funding is to be maintained.

Rev. Wilson (left) had his own 80th birthday gift for the village. He donated a piece of land he had purchased to be used as a Village Green. We now know it as Church Green.



Lapford Weather Review



LAPFORD WEATHER JANUARY 2022

Monthly temperature was average, but only half average rainfall.

The mildest day was the 1st with a maximum of 13.8°C, not the mildest January day we have had, that was back in 2016.

The first three days of the month were very mild, continuing on from the end of December.

The coolest day was the 21^{st} with a maximum of 4.5° C. The coldest night was on the 21^{st} when the air temperature fell to -4.0° C, and the grass temperature fell to -9.4° C.

There were 19 grass frosts through the month, which has delayed the onset of flowering bulbs to more like a normal time as opposed to some more recent years when this has been earlier than average.

Total rainfall was 50.5mm, exactly half the average for January.

The wettest day was the 7th with a fall of 10.7mm rain.

The windiest day was the 8th with a gust of 46 m.p.h.



A big thank you to all of you who came to the Quiz on Friday 11th February in support of our 'Window Fund'. We hope you all enjoyed the evening. Our first estimate is that about £300 was raised. Why have we got a 'Window Fund'?

The first references to the church were in 1838. However from the research Noel Parry did for his book on the history of the church, it looks as if building work started in 1846. So the windows, which are made of wood, have been around for a long time and have reached the end of their life. We have some with 'lumps' falling out on the outside and on the inside at least one is crumbling to dust! They need replacing!



We have had a quote of £38,000 to replace all the windows, a big ask!! We will be holding further fund-raising events which we trust you will support. We are also looking at possible funding streams but, as I am sure you are aware, we have to be seen to be making an effort to raise money ourselves before any bid we make is considered. To date we have raised about £2,000. We are ooking forward to your support for this big venture and will keep you appraised of our progress.



FIRE SAFETY

About three years ago, a very nice fireman (I am not sure that we can call them that now) came to Phoenix House in Tiverton to give us a talk about fire safety. We were told that if one conformed to a few simple criteria we could have a home visit and we were asked to spread the information about this service. We were all given a card with all the necessary needed to contact the fire service. I went home full of good intentions to contact them myself. I put the card in a drawer and promptly forgot all about it.



If you are over 55, living alone, have children living in the house, have a disability or are a smoker, you can qualify for a fire safety visit from the fire service. As I knew that I didn't have a smoke or a carbon monoxide alarm in my

home and I qualified on several points, I decide to see how it worked. A simple phone call to the number on my card and a visit was arranged for the following week. A charming gentleman arrived and we chatted about the danger points in my home and safe exit points, most of which I already knew but it was reassuring to have them reinforced by the expert. He then fitted a smoke alarm to the ceiling in the hall and a carbon monoxide alarm near to my wood burner. All in all, he was here for about an hour and it didn't cost a penny. He explained that it was cheaper to prevent a house fire than to have to turn out and fight it with the added risk to life.

Before he left, I asked if I could still pass on information about this service to either individuals or societies in Lapford that may benefit from knowing about it. LAPFORD BOOK CLUB REVIEW – THE SAPPHIRE WIDOW BY DINAH JEFFERIES

This book, set in Ceylon, 1935, concerns a seemingly happily married couple, Louisa and Elliot. She is the daughter of a gemstone merchant and he works with her father. He is also a gambler and, when he is killed in a car crash, all kinds of lies and deceits come to light – debts, a mistress, a child (most painful of all as Louisa has suffered from several miscarriages) and an apparent partnership in a cinnamon plantation. As she is left to unravel her late husband's life, whilst being harassed by his creditors, she is eventually able to put her own life back together.

There are lovely descriptions of the scenery and way of life in Ceylon at the time, and very interesting information on how the cinnamon we use is produced. However, we were all agreed that the story was fairly limited, with every plot development well sign-posted, and was probably best enjoyed as a holiday read. Louisa did, however, live happily ever after.

BIOGRAPHIES AND DIARIES

At the suggestion of an ex-girlfriend, I have kept a diary for the last thirteen years. This is a habit I have kept four times longer than the actual relationship, which says more about my habits, than my choice of partner. I do it for mental clarity, even though I wonder what my stepson will actually do with them when I am not here.

This must explain why I am fascinated by autobiographies, biographies and diaries. This, for an avid reader like myself, is the equivalent of a nourishing meal. You can learn a lot about your favourite celebrity, the best will leave the odd unanswered question. Either way, there is skill and craft involved as much as a good read.

So firstly, a word about celebrity autobiographies: don't read them. They are the instant noodles of the book world, but at least instant noodles aren't sold at 50% off in January. If this is your bag, bag them then. Sports biographies used to be like that and still are to a certain extent. Possibly the best: 61 Minutes in Munich by Howard Gayle, the first black player to play for Liverpool. Honest about both what was a disappointing career and the part that racism played in curtailing it.

Music is my other big passion, and again there has also been an improvement in this genre. *Me* by Elton John is candid, shocking and no stone is left unturned, either in terms of his sexuality, addictions or tantrums. It also confirms the urban myth that whilst staying in a hotel, he rang his record company to ask the wind to stop blowing outside his room.

Keith Richards confirms the "I am not your drummer story" in *Life*, as well as his ongoing guerrilla war with Mick Jagger - he describes him as "a nice bunch of blokes." *I'll Never Write My Autobiography* by Grace Jones is in the same vein, with possible pub quiz questions about regretting turning down a role in *Blade Runner* and being asked to do *Slave to the Rhythm* by Trevor Horn, whilst setting fire to her then boyfriend Dolph Lungren's trousers.

Head On/Repossessed is a double volume charting Julian Cope's rise from slacking Scouse student teacher to post-punk icon and finally, The Arch Drude we know and love today. The best is undoubtedly Miles: The Autobiography. Published a few years before an untimely/somewhat inevitable death, Miles Davis talks at length about being one of the great artists of the twentieth century, but with as much honey as venom. It's like being mugged by angels.

For actors and entertainers, start with *Who on Earth Is Tom Baker?* It's delicious stuff from the best Doctor Who. It's good on growing up as a Catholic in 1930's Liverpool as much as Tom's "experiences" with *Doctor Who* groupies or drinking with Francis Bacon. John Peel was halfway through *Margrave of the Marshes* when he died. And appropriately enough, you get two sides of the man: the first is as dilatory as Peel himself, the second reveals someone with real doubts and insecurities.

A recent read was I Know This Much Is True by Miriam Gargoyles. Arch, entertaining and completely filthy. The book is pretty much the same. See also Absolute Pandemonium by Brian Blessed. Jasper Rees was given access to Victoria Wood's archives by her family. Let's Do It is a loving portrait of a much-missed comic mind, but someone with a propensity for personal cruelty as much as a Stakhanovite work ethic.

In a similar vein, Piers Paul Read was given access to Alec Guinness' diaries. This is as complete a picture as you'll get, despite the destruction of several volumes of diaries throughout his lifetime (and Read explores the reasons why). It's shows a man who was fastidious, insecure about his own talents and ultimately resentful of being in *Star Wars*, which gave both financial freedom and an unwanted, but geeky fanbase.

Richard Burton's widow gave Swansea University his diaries after his death. Chris Williams condenses 45 years of introspection into nearly 700 pages of brutal honesty, self-destructive behaviour (hence lapses in the narrative) and a man who wanted to be rich, but with minimum effort. Finally, Richard E Grant's diaries *With Nails* is as gossipy and witty as the man himself.

So, plenty to enjoy till Alan Rickman's diaries are published in October. You can expect my diaries sometime in the late 21st century, subject to my stepson understanding my handwriting and legal clearances.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, JANUARY AND FEBRUARY 2022

Please note this is a summary of the main points of interest. A copy of the draft minutes will be made available on the Council website, www.lapfordparishcouncil.org.uk and on the notice boards in the Orchard Centre and in The ARK.

The Parish Council met on 18th January in the Victory Hall.

Five members of the public attended.

The meeting stood in silence as a mark of remembrance and respect for Ian Hemsworth who died on 3rd January and had been Chair of the Council for five years up until May 2021.

- In answer to a statement from a member of the public regarding Lower Town Place the Locum Clerk replied that a report he was preparing on that subject would hopefully be presented to Councillors at the next meeting.
- The Church Green Trustees had met. The Chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter had been cut back. It would be reinspected for health & safety reasons in the Spring. The revised Governing Document could now be presented to the Charity Commission.
- The Chairman and County Councillor to arrange to meet with the Highways Officer to discuss outstanding issues, and the locum clerk to write to DCC Highways re the lack of action on local Highways problems.
- The misinformation on the Lapford Post Office website had not been corrected despite requests for this to happen. The matter could not be dealt with locally.
- A small working party had been set up to plan for the local celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. It would operate with insurance through the Parish Council.
- Section 106 funding possibilities were discussed.
- The planning application to provide toilet facilities at the Parish Church was supported.

The Parish Council met again on 2nd February 2022.

Eight members of the public attended.

- The Locum Clerk would progress the matter of 106 finance to assist the Football Club.
- The telephone box at Moorland View was in bad repair and would be chained shut to avoid danger to the public pending repair work being carried out.
- A councillor vacancy now existed.
- County Councillor Margaret Squires' written report was received.
- The Lapford Emergency Plan Committee had met. There were still outstanding training matters relating to the Road Warden scheme and the Snow Warden to be addressed through the Highways Officer. This has resulted in the village having no accredited Snow Warden at the moment. First Aid/ Defibrillator training will be offered soon. Details to follow in the Lapford Lookout. A Foodbank report was received (see separate article)
- Planning permission has been granted for seven dwellings on the Yeo Vale site.
- Councillors were told about the exhibition in The ARK relating to the village clock in the Church Tower.
- The Locum Clerk's appointment was made permanent initially for a fixed contract of twelve months.
- The Locum Clerk's report on the history of the Lower Town Place project was received. This would be condensed so that the Council could start a conversation with other Lapford groups to look for ways forward for the future.

The Council will meet again on 2nd March 2022.

IMPORTANT HISTORICAL VILLAGE BOOKS

When clearing through the house of my late uncle, George Gunn, in Lapford, my mother Ann Cann (maiden name Gunn) found various books that seemed to have nothing to do with the family even though we've been there for 75 years. Many had family names Dart, Horwill and Snell written inside.

The one important one of these is a handwritten volume bound in white board, it is marked in gold on a burgundy label as being the "Overseers' Book of Receipts & Payments" for Lapford. As far as we are aware it had literally been sat in a cupboard for the last 75 years. It is handwritten inside the front cover by John Dart many times and twice adding Assistant Overseer Lapford and also by Samuel Dart and Henry Dart.

The entries are from 9 May 1848 to a last entry 6 March 1868. They are an account book registering various payments paid into the scheme and those paid out to people for various reasons, particularly when the gentleman of the household had run away leaving the family to fend for themselves.

For anybody interested in village history this is a particularly important book. The Devon Heritage Centre in Exeter has various Overseers Books for Lapford and this volume appears to be missing from the collection as they only have records up to 1848. This volume ends with the account for the half year ending Lady Day 1868 and audited 9 June 1868 at about half way through, rest is blank.

To ensure that the information can be easily used locally, the Lapford Village Archive has been allowed to photograph the book so they can work on it before it gets deposited for safekeeping at the Devon Heritage Centre.

So before it is worked on by the Lapford Village Archive here are just a few example entries.

- 1 April 1852 paid for warrant to apprehend William Raymont who has deserted his family. 2/6
- 1 March 1864 Paid George Woolway, Carpenters Bill for repairing Parish Property. £5 11/4
- 1 March 1864 Paid Magistrates Clerks fees for commitments of John Ferris for vagrancy. 8/0



SOME UNUSUAL NATIVE TREES AROUND LAPFORD

There are two interesting native trees growing in and around Lapford. One is relatively well known, the other almost of unheard of but it is a true Devon speciality. These are the Wild Service and the Devon Whitebeam trees, botanically *Sorbus torminalis* and *S. devoniensis*.

The first is a widespread European tree which in England is very common in south east England and often known as Chequers and in the west Midlands and areas of limey soil. The fruits are edible and most books on trees give some detail about eating the fruit. Sadly in Devon it is not an abundant fruit producer, even where it flowers well. The fruit it produces is around thumbnail size and brown to orange-brown ripening in October/November. The distribution in Devon is very scattered, with 'hot spots' and, rather than 'not spots', large areas where it has not been found, largely dependent on the soil derived from the underlying rocks but also due to the climate of Devon, it's not quite the Continental south east. So it is unusual here for a good reason.





It is an attractive species. Its leaves are maple like but arranged alternately along the stem, where in maples they are opposite each other. In May it has heads of white flowers followed by bunches of fruit in autumn. Although in Devon a few fruit in the bunch is generally the best to hope for.

There is a plant of this in the parish. The plant is on the side of the A377 between Pope's Wood and Lapfordwood House which I recorded in July 1996. Then close by but just into Chawleigh parish further along the A377, between Nymet Bridge and Chenson are two together in a hedge which I recorded in 1992. The next nearest are one on the roadside from Morchard Bishop to Morchard Road, in a hedge between East Leigh and Zeal Monachorum and one on a bank west of Coldridge heading down to the Taw north of Brushford. All first recorded in the 1990s while I was out exploring.

There are not many locally to look at, so imagine my surprise in finding a huge length of hedge well within the parish in June 2021. Not usually known for suckering, there was a stretch of about 30 paces long and another shorter stretch further down the hill in the same hedge. It is easy to spot, it's in the south hedge on the road from Lapford to Eastington. and as I found around Yeoford in 2020, where three new specimens were discovered. There is still plenty to find, who knows what there is in the hedges not by roadsides and footpaths?

The other plant, Devon Whitebeam, doesn't make it into the parish but is very, very close. On the Chawleigh road between Forches Cross and Leigh Cross, and just into Chawleigh parish, there are three plants in the hedge, on the west side of the road by Nutson entrance. Being roadside plants they are understandably heavily pruned. This is a far more interesting species. Almost every single native plant grows in Devon. You can count the number of plants growing in the rest of England, on just your fingers and toes. In Devon around 1,000-1500 plants are known, most north of Okehampton.



Why? Well this species and many others in Britain, Ireland and Continental Europe have odd genetics. They don't reproduce in the normal way of pollen fertilising an egg to make a fertile seed with the

genetics of both plants. At some point after the last ice age the Wild Service Tree and one of the Whitebeams produced a one-off hybrid plant. This plant would have been expected to be sterile but the confused genetics of the plant resulted in the genetic material doubling making it fertile. The result of this was that the egg didn't need to be fertilised by pollen to produce the seed and the seed produced a plant genetically identical to the parent, and so on down the generations.

From that one event it slowly spread from where ever it was created in north Devon, across the north of Devon and hopped to Roborough (the one by Plymouth), Little Haldon above the Teign Estuary and southeast Ireland.

This happened twice more in Devon (and many times in Europe) and those species are even rarer and grow on the north Devon coast. There is another species of the same origin in the Avon Gorge at Bristol.

The leaves are hazel-like but start off grey hairy on both sides, the topside shedding the hairs and becoming dark green and the fruit are like the Wild Service Tree though generally more orangey-brown and far more productive. The fruit were even sold in Barnstaple Pannier Market. The round up of market prices in the North Devon Journal has them at a penny a bunch in 1925, 1926 and 1929, though sadly not who sold them.

It can grow to be a medium sized tree, bigger than a large fruiting cherry tree but is most often seen in hedges where it survives moderate cutting very well.

So could there be some Devon Whitebeams and more Wild Service Trees in Lapford to find? Yes, It just needs the right eyes looking in the right places. So many hedges, so little time. If you think you have found one then email me a picture.

THE VILLAGE CLOCK

The chimes of the clock in the Church tower have been silent for more than a year now! To restore them, and to safeguard the future of the clock itself requires much thought and hard decision making.

In 1909 Lapford celebrated the 80th birthday of its long-serving and much-loved Rector – the Revd CW Wilson. To provide a lasting tribute a subscription was raised amongst the villagers and others to purchase and install a public clock in the Church tower, the same clock which is running today – the heartbeat of the village.

The original clock mechanism is fine, there are no issues with it despite its age. However, there are problems with the bearings where the shaft to the hands passes through the tower wall to the face which we all see; and with the winding mechanism which governs the chimes.

In the year 2000 a motorised system was installed to wind up the weights which allow the chimes to work. Previously this had been done by a person, latterly George Tucker, climbing the tower each week to wind the weights up manually.

Now, after more than twenty years' service the circuit board controlling the winding motor has failed. Interestingly Lapford's is not the only clock to be suffering in this way. There is also evidence that the motors themselves may be working on borrowed time. The whole clock workings are very dirty as they are unprotected.

A quote of £2,000 has been received to replace the switches and circuit boards only; a quote of £8,000 to replace the whole driving system and build a protective cover around it, and to replace the shaft bearings. This is the solution recommended by Cumbria Clocks.

The Parish Council which maintains the clock is looking for comments from the public to inform its decision making about the future. There are three choices:

Do nothing, so that when the clock next stops that will be it.

Spend £2,000 for a quick but temporary fix.

Spend £8,000 to make a proper job of repairing and safeguarding the clock for the future.
