



AVIAN FLU UPDATE (from the Government website, April 2022)

'Avian influenza (bird flu) mainly affects birds. It can also affect humans and other mammals.

Avian influenza (bird flu) is a notifiable animal disease. If you suspect any type of avian influenza in poultry or captive birds you must report it immediately by calling the Defra Rural Services Helpline on 03000 200 301. In Wales, contact 0300 303 8268. In Scotland, contact your local Field Services Office. Failure to do so is an offence.

If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline (03459 33 55 77). **Do** not touch or pick up any dead or visibly sick birds that you find. For further information see Defra's advice to the public.

All bird keepers (whether you have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) must keep a close watch on them for signs of disease and maintain good biosecurity at all times. If you have any concerns about the health of your birds, seek prompt advice from your vet.

You should register your poultry, even if only kept as pets, so we can contact you during an outbreak. This is a legal requirement if you have 50 or more birds. Poultry includes chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese, pigeon (bred for meat), partridge, quail, guinea fowl and pheasants.'

Locally outbreaks have been confirmed at Moonridge Farm, Newton St Cyres, and at Tedburn St Mary, and the flocks there were culled. Dead geese have been reported at Shobrooke Park.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT 2022/2023


The Parish Council set its precept for 1st April 2022 at a level to balance its budgeted expenditure for the year. The result is that a Band D household will pay a parish council charge of £55.61 for the year compared with the current year's charge of £53.59. This is an increase for the year of just £2.02, (3.8%) or 17 pence per month.

The amount of income received from these charges will increase from £20,713.42 in 2021/22 to £22,216 next year amounting to an extra £1,500.

To put this in perspective the annual Band D property charges for the Parish District and County Councils, combined with the Devon & Cornwall Police Authority amounted in 2021/22 to £2,121.

The budget has been done at the base level of expenditure, assuming no major capital works in the year, with the precept set to cover this expenditure. There is the possibility that projects will emerge during the year and it is envisaged that these will be financed by obtaining grants and using the uncommitted reserves it has available currently standing at just over £28,000.

Attached is a pie chart which shows the breakdown of what the precept will be spent on during the year.




LAPFORD BOOK CLUB BOOK REVIEW — LAMENTATION

Our book for March was 'Lamentation' by C.J. Sansom.

This is the 6th book in the Matthew Shardlake series. The book is set during the reign of Henry VIII. Lamentation refers to a book that Queen Catherine Parr has written entitled 'Lamentation of a Sinner'. The book has religious connotations and so is rather controversial as the King considers himself head of the church and there are many different religious factions in England, so the Queen keeps it locked up, frightened that the King might take exception to it. Then it goes missing – stolen.

Matthew Shardlake is a lawyer and a detective who has a soft spot for the Queen, so she asks him to find the book.

There are many twists and turns, murder and mystery in this enthralling book. Very well written and describes excellently, the atmosphere, costumes and smells of Tudor London from the wealth of Whitehall Place to the dungeons of the Tower. A book I couldn't put down despite its 650 pages!



BOOK REVIEW - THE SLOW ROAD TO TEHRAN BY REBECCA LOWE

In 2015, Rebecca Lowe spent 11 months cycling from London to Iran on what was part fact-finder, part act of Stakhanovite endurance. She's a journalist with extensive experience in The Middle East. And probably here, is the first of many points of exploration. At different times, different empires have defined the spot at where Europe ends and what we know as The Middle East (first used in 1900 by Thomas Edward Gordon) begins.

And Lowe is honest about the misgivings and both family and fixers. She eats where she can, but drinking is possibly more important in 44-degree heat. You can almost taste that, as much as the metre-long kebabs. Her panniers include GPS, a mobile phone and a laptop. Thankfully, she leaves the ukulele. She's reliant on the kindness of strangers and is at constant threat of either assault or harassment by some of them.

That is the real key to this book's enjoyability. Lowe comes across as an engaging, knowledgeable guide to countries that are frequently viewed by us as rogue states where religion is weaponised in acts of hatred. What she finds is that most people just want to be safe, happy and free. And she's absolutely right in saying: we created all that for political power, an illusory form of safety and cheap oil. It's a human book, with a granular, sand-coloured level of research.



However, it's the characters in this book that stand out. The Egyptian medical students who use English textbooks as they're easier to understand, the bisexual Iranian woman who campaigns for gay rights and the sadly numerous people at constant threat of arrest and torture for merely speaking out against their own government.

I should also mention the other character in this book. Her bike, Maud (named after a female traveller). You'll gasp as Maud sends Rebecca into a ditch. You'll wince as she crashes, crushing a pint of milk against her laptop. Slow punctures are written with the tension of painful conversations and a week long wait for a vital part for a bike chain is tense, gorgeous and ultimately satisfying.

Those seven days are spent secretly partying with Iranian youth, attending a wedding, before ultimately finding out it is rude to immediately accept an invitation; unless someone waives your obligation to refuse three times.

In short though, Lowe has created a book which could have been a leaden, two-wheeled slog. She's instead created something with kindness, propelled by human energy and literary skill. Accept her invitation to travel.



LADIES OF LAPFORD

March saw our LOLs number yet again affected by Covid. Still we were 11 gathered to listen to our speaker for the evening Pauline representing **Guide Dogs for the Blind Association**. Pauline arrived accompanied by her husband and their five year old beautiful chocolate brown Labrador Frank. Frank had trained as a Guide dog but proved a little too sensitive to work hence he'd stayed on with Pauline and hubby. Clearly loved, Frank had calm demeanour and the most beautiful eyes — which I noted did seem focussed on Marilyn a good chunk of the evening.

We learned that our speakers had worked as puppy socialisers – that's the bit where puppies live with families to learn good socialisation skills in the community as part of training – but now retired worked as ambassadors to promote the association while still keeping their hands in temporarily respite homing guide dogs if there was a need ie if an owner needed a hospital stay.

It was a fascinating talk and we learned so much. Guide dogs are born in specialist breeding units now. Retrievers along with Labradors are considered all round good temperament. Guide dogs are trained with kindness and reward only, both reinforced, never reprimanded – a little bit of amusement here at the thought of teaching puppy to wee outside not on the Axminster. Guide dogs are not bathed or encouraged to enjoy being in water, one doesn't throw a ball in play with the dog but it's okay to roll the ball - both for obvious reasons when one thinks about it.

It's a very careful procedure to match trained dog and prospective owner. It involves a two-week 'hotel' stay while they learn to know each other.

Fact - the Guide Dog Association petitioned government about the lack of noise Electric cars make and the problems they caused for the blind pedestrian at kerbside – now cars are required to make a noise driven below 20 miles an hour after which tyre sound kicks in.

A most enjoyable evening enjoyed by all; thanks to our speakers, to Marilyn for the delicious, huge, Victoria Sandwich cake, and to Sue B-E who stepped in as Barista for the evening.

(I believe I should add a disclaimer here in case my facts aren't quite accurate as there has been 'a lot of water under my bridge' since the talk!)

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL - HIGHWAYS REPORT

Highways Issues.

The Chairman and other Parish Councillors recently met with the local Highways Officer to discuss the many issues concerning the roads and drains in the parish. The main points are listed below.

Potholes. Particularly the road from Blackaditch to Kelland Cottages and the access road to the village across the river and railway bridges. Both these problems are on the DCC action list to repair, but the timing is unknown.

Flooding, particularly on the road from Kelland Cottages to the football field. The drain there has now been cleared.

Lack of fencing to protect the gap in the hedge by the river bridge. This had been added to the County list two years ago, but no action was taken, despite many requests from the Parish Council. The matter to be revisited and new evidence presented.

A377 danger presented by the felling of trees on the left hand side as there is no verge or hedge between the road and the drop to the river below. The DCC Road Safety Officer will investigate and recommend any action necessary.

How can we help?

The Parish Council volunteer Road Warden in Training will be able to address some local issues, but the main advice to the public is to report issues to DCC via the Highways pages of the website

Go to www.devon.gov.uk>roadsandtransport Click on the 'Report a problem' box and then choose the appropriate option from potholes or flooding or streetlights or whatever else concerns you. An interactive map will allow pinpointing of the issue(s).

In an emergency call 0345 155 1004.


Pothole repairs are only carried out on those identified up to a month in advance and logged on the GPS tracking system the repair gangs work from. The advice therefore is to keep on reporting issues which have not been dealt with. (The local Highways Officer has no more influence than a member of the public over this process.)

Streetlight failures. Report using the process above. Each problem light must be identified and reported on individually. **Planned road closures.** These can be checked on, anywhere in the country and up to two weeks in advance, by looking online at one.network (make sure you look at the UK version).

Lapford Weather Review

LAPFORD WEATHER MARCH 2022

Milder than average and dry.

The mildest day was the 24^{th} with a maximum of 17.5° C, and the coolest was the 7^{th} which reached 7.1° C. The joint coldest nights were the 5^{th} and the 7^{th} , both of which had air minimums of -0.9° C. The lowest grass frost was on the 5^{th} , when the temperature fell to -5.5° C.

Total rainfall was 39.7 mm, nearly half the average for March. There was no measurable rain from the 17th to the end of the month. Dry spells are really quite common in Spring.

The windiest day was the 12th with a gust of 44 m.p.h.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, MARCH 2022

Please note this is a summary of the main points of interest. A copy of the draft minutes will be made available on the Council website, www.lapfordparishcouncil.org.uk and on the notice boards in the Orchard Centre and in The Ark.

The Parish Council met on 15th March in the Victory Hall.

Five members of the public attended.

The meeting stood in silence as a mark of respect for the people of Ukraine.

- The Church Green Trustees had met. The health of the Chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter to be reassessed. MDDC now considered that Planning Permission would probably be needed for work to the bank between the Green and Lower Town Place.
- A meeting had taken place between Parish Councillors, the County Councillor, and the area Highways Officer to discuss local Highways issues. (See separate report).
- The Council agreed to underwrite costs for the Jubilee celebrations up to the limit of £500. It was hoped that the event would break even.
- Section 106 funding possibilities were discussed further including the bid from the Football Club.
- Invitation to quote for the next twelve months' grass cutting in the village to be advertised.
- No objections were registered to the planning applications for 31 Highfield and Higher Eastington Farmhouse.
- A litter pick to be arranged for Saturday 9th April.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, APRIL 2022

The Parish Council met again on 6th April 2022.

Three members of the public attended.

- The Church Green Trustees had met. The Chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter had been reassessed as safe for the present. The treatment of the planned entrance from the frontage of The Ark to The Green was agreed as proposed. No firm advice was forthcoming from MDDC re Planning Permission for the bank.
- The spending of the remaining Calor Gas grant money was being investigated with a proposal that it could pay for broadband connections to the Victory Hall, the Congregational Church and the Parish Church.
- A date was set for a Parish Council group to look at the future of the Orchard Centre.
- A meeting to be set up with representatives of Heart for Lapford Development.
- Exeter Community Energy to stage an event on the Church Green on 26th April.
- In-house training for the Parish Councillors is being arranged.
- Those responsible for staging the Village Clock exhibition in the Ark were thanked. Responses received have been in favour of complete restoration. The future of the clock to be looked at again shortly.
- £400 has been received for work to the parish footpaths.
- A replacement bench for the one removed for safety reasons will be purchased. It will commemorate the Queen's Jubilee.
- The revised Asset Register was adopted.
- A Grant-giving policy was adopted.
- The planning application for Court Barton Farm was supported. A site visit will be requested re the application to build houses on land off Eastington Lane.
- The Council will meet again on 4th May. This will be the Annual Meeting of the Council. The Annual Parish Meeting was set for Saturday 14th May at 10-30am in the Victory Hall.

HISTORY OF CHURCH VIEW

Extract from A North Devon Village, by Nellie J. Drake. Nellie wrote the book after walking through the village with her friend Jane who had lived in the village all her life. There is no indication of Jane's age or the year the book was published. As far as I know Nellie lived in what became, until recently, the Post Office. Gordon Drake also lived there — brother or husband?

"The two houses opposite the church were built, Jane recalled, when she was a schoolgirl. During the dinner hour the children used to play in them. It was fun watching the houses being built. Every day a few more bricks, a little more flooring, or a window, and when they were finished, and the children were no longer allowed to play in them they were really sorry. It had almost seemed as if the houses had belonged to them, and now other people – entire strangers in one case came and took possession."

"This indenture made the 1st day of October 1878 between The Reverend Cornelius William Wilson of Lapford in the County of Devon Clerk in Holy Orders of the one part and Thomas Howard Woolway of Lapford aforesaid Carpenter of the Other part WHEREAS by Indenture bearing date the tenth day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy eight and made between Susanna Grendon of the first part William Grendon the Younger and George Grendon of the second part John Grendon and Anna Maria his wife of the third part and the said Cornelius William Wilson of the fourth part (inter alia) the messuages or dwellinghouses hereditaments and premises hereinafter described and intended to be hereby conveyed were granted and conveyed unto and to the use of the said Cornelius William Wilson his heirs and assigns for ever AND WHEREAS the said Cornelius William Wilson hath agreed with the said Thomas Howard Woolway for the absolute sale to him of the hereditaments intended to be hereby granted and the inheritance thereof in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances at the price of £200 NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in pursuance of the said agreement and in consideration of the sum of £200 to the said Cornelius William Wilson paid by the said Thomas Howard Woolway at or upon the execution of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged He the said Cornelius William Wilson doth hereby grant unto the said Thomas Howard Woolway and his heirs ALL THOSE three cottages tenements or dwellinghouses (formerly two cottages only) with the herb gardens thereto adjoining formerly called or commonly known by the name of Lees and Richards Tenements but heretofore called or commonly known by the name of Richards Tenement late in the possession of Joseph Richards but now in the occupation of Anna Richards John Cornall and George Woolway AND ALSO ALL that waste and unenclosed plot of ground in front of the said cottages and gardens belonging thereto bounded by the highway leading from Lapford to Bow on the West and by Lapford Court Barton and the Waste in front of and belonging thereto on the East and South parts and which said premises are more particularly described in the Map or plan drawn in the margin of these presents and therein coloured green and red Together with all ways paths passages rights lights of this Indenture, but the above shows the most interesting wording. It should be said that the three cottages may have stood nearer the church than 1 and 2 Church View do now. Originally both houses were not given a number and it is only in recent years that the two houses have been known as 1 and 2 Church View. 2 Church View may have once, a long time ago, been called Rose Cottage.

Mr T.H. Woolway died on 21 November 1913 leaving the property to his niece Charlotte Woolway, by Abstract of Probate of Will, dated 05 February 1914. John Skinner Horwill and Sydney Snell were executors of his will.

- 23 April 1937 Letters of Administration to Sydney Snell, husband of Charlotte Woolway Snell who died 17 March 1937.
- 12 September 1939 Assent to Sydney Snell as sole beneficiary of Estate of C.E.W. Snell his wife.
- 25 March 1946 Conveyance of Church View from Mr S. Snell to Mr A.C. Gunn.

The 1911 census shows the tenant of Church View as Adolphus England (Accountant), Helen, (his wife) and Ethel Emie Mitchell (his daughter).

At some point a Doctor's surgery was held in a room at Church View, as was a Chiropodist's surgery during Mum's time.

John Skinner Horwill and his wife, Charlotte (Lottie/ Granny Horwill) were tenants until Mr Horwill died in February 1944. Dad (Bert Gunn) bought Church View at auction in the Victory Hall for £1,250, plus the land beside the Victory Hall, for £50. He didn't move in until the following March, allowing Granny Horwill to find somewhere else to live without her being rushed. She eventually moved into Vine Cottage, the one nearest the road.

When Mr Snell was clearing out 2 Church View, he passed in Scrap Books, shell boxes, tiny oil lamps, sewing kits, manicure sets and story books which, I believe were marked at 1p. One of the books was The Pied Piper of Hamelin. As young children we were

February The pleasantly situated semi-detached residence known as ' Church View " was sold to Mr. Gunn, for £1.250; a rich pacture field, about 42 acres, was previously sold privately to Mr. A. G. Benfield; large barn adjoining the road, withdrawn; a garden 16ft, by 60ft., adjoining the Victory Hall, was sold to Mr. Gunn for £50. The solicitors concerned were Messrs. W. H. Stone and Co., of 6, Northernhay Exeter.

delighted with these items. A Rayburn was installed in the 1950s by a man from Chulmleigh, and a bathroom in the 1960s by Gordon Boatfield and Malcolm Ridd.


I can remember, as I stood by the front gate, Mrs Tipper, wife of George Tipper the Headmaster, asking me if I was looking forward to going to school.

We had good views of any weddings at the church from our front bedroom windows and when there was a funeral, the wartime blackout blinds were pulled down in respect. On one occasion

the spare front room was used by an incoming priest, Revd Judd I think, for him to change into his garments before his inauguration. When the fair was held in Bill Manning's yard and field, a young girl from the top of the village fell in a cowpat and was brought across to Church View to be washed down! Her mother gave Mum a box of Milk Tray the following week to say thank you. The Revel was right on our doorstep and the scrambling for pennies and sweets took place in the road outside our front gate, whilst the Fancy Dress competition was on the Church Green, with every entrant standing on the War Memorial.

LAPFORD YOUTH CLUB

The last twelve months have been an exciting time for Lapford Youth Club. Around May last year, the Youth Club joined forces with High Five Friday. This allowed the Youth Club to start taster sessions in the summer months with minimal cost as there were several toys, craft materials and pieces of equipment passed over from High Five Friday.

Since September, the Youth Club has run High Five Thursdays for 7-12 years. This has taken place the majority of weeks during term time. The sessions that haven't taken place are mainly down to the spread of covid. The Youth Club now has nearly 80 children on its register aged between 7-16. There is an average of 30-35 children that attend High Five Thursdays on a regular basis with around 45-50 regular attendees.

In January, the Youth Club started to run 'The Drop In.' These sessions cater for secondary school age children and we are getting an average of about ten children at each session. Moving forward, it would be nice to see if we could recruit more volunteers for these sessions so they can run on a more regular basis. I believe this will help to increase the numbers that come.

During the winter months, the hall has had its limitations and there has not been enough space for the children to run around freely which they have found frustrating. We have had to be very creative with trying to control the large number of children in a small space which at times has been stressful for the volunteers. We have around 20 volunteers that put their time into helping at our sessions. They are a truly dedicated team and I would like to thank each and every one of them for their continued energy and support.

We have a fantastic group of children that attend the Youth Club but we do sometimes have issues with behaviour. In recent months we have introduced a behaviour policy so that our expectations and consequences for breaking the rules are in black and white. We have also introduced green cards for children who struggle to verbalise when they are anxious or upset. The most recent addition is our house teams. These are named after memorable or loved characters relating to children's work in Lapford (Parry, Partridge, Hemsworth, Gilpin).

The #Don't poo where we play campaign made a splash on the back page of the Lapford Lookout. There is more to come and I hope that this will help eradicate the problem of dog fouling on Lower Town Place and the village in general. The children have also produced some of their own art work to support this campaign.

This summer, the Youth Club looks forward to helping at the Jubilee celebrations with a disco on 3rd June. This will be a family event and a good opportunity for the Youth Club to promote itself.

A few of the volunteers will be helping put on a craft stall every few months at the village Market. We are hoping this will encourage families to attend.

One area that needs improving is more being put on social media and using social media to its full effect. A parent volunteer has come forward to help so hopefully we will be able to move forward with this in the very near future.

Looking ahead, I would like the committee to think about spending out some more money on toys and equipment, especially when entering the autumn months. As we run on a weekly basis, I think the children would like to see a bigger variation of activities, especially when they can't be outdoors. The committee might need to think about fundraising ideas towards this.

I look forward to a bright future for the Youth Club and would like to thank the committee for their continued support.
