

Lapford Weather Review

LAPFORD WEATHER AUGUST 2022

Warmer and a little drier than average. Not however record breaking in this corner of Devon as August 1995 was warmer.

The hottest day was the 12th with a maximum of 32.9°C, the hottest day since the 3rd August 1990. This occurred in the middle of a week long heat wave. The coolest day was the 5th with a maximum of 18.9°C. The coolest night was on the 5th with a minimum of 7.1°C and a grass temperature of just 1.1°C, remarkably chilly for August.

Total rainfall was 63.3 mm, with most of this falling on two days, the 15th and 16th. The latter was the wettest day with 30.9 mm, but the previous day was more interesting with a succession of thunderstorms in the afternoon producing some very close lightning strikes. Apart from these two days it was a mainly dry month.

The windiest day was the 29th with a gust of 29 m.p.h.

Summer 2022 was warmer and drier than average, although there have been three warmer and six drier ones in the last 35

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I witnessed a near miss accident this morning where a car narrowly missed hitting a child on a bike on the way to Lapford School. I was wondering whether it is worth me writing to the Parish Council about the dangerous situation we have at school drop-off and pickup times where cars, lorries, tractors etc are mixing at close proximity with cyclists, pedestrians and kids on scooters.

The worst spot on the way to the school is the corner just before the Congregational Church. Many children on bikes keep to the left-hand side instead of switching to the cycle lane. The cycle lane is poorly marked and has no bike logo on it. Many people do not know it is a cycle lane. Motorists are aware of people coming to school and so squeeze to the right-hand side on the way back from the school. Consequently, anyone cycling on the left-hand side coming from the opposite direction has a good chance of being hit.


There are no school zone signs on the road, no speed bumps etc. Anyone bringing children to school will drive slowly but those passing through the village on business not so. We have all witnessed these occurrences where people are driving too fast past children a few inches away and wobbling on their various modes of transport. It would be terrible if we had to wait for an accident to occur before improvements were made.

TWO PICTURES: THE STORY BEHIND THE COVER PAGES

These two very contrasting pictures of Queen Elizabeth II were both drawn specifically for royal celebrations in Lapford. They are from two very different times - drawn 63 years apart by two Lapford residents born more than 90 years apart! Although remarkable changes in technology and social attitudes took place between the two pictures, their subject matter remained the same. It is a reminder of the continuity the Queen provided us all in our rapidly changing lives.

The first drawing is taken from a picture of the Queen and Prince Philip that once hung from the chimney of the Ambrosia factory. It was floodlit during the 1953 Coronation celebrations. The artist was a factory worker, Edmund Stals. Only five years previously he had fled Russian officials in his native Latvia, living for weeks in woodland before fleeing to England as a refugee.

If the rumours are true that the tops were from beer bottles, there must have been plenty of village celebrations!

It is a drawing familiar to generations in Lapford: a large chalk and pastel version hung in the Malt Scoop and Ambrosia social club, and there are still versions of the picture in the Victory Hall and Congregational Church.

During filming for BBC's Antiques Road Show in 2001, art expert Peter Nahum described the picture as "from a lost era" and "by an artist of considerable talent". Edmund died in 1999. His family still live in the village. Edmund's drawing was of a young Queen who, in the eyes of an artist who had seen the atrocities of war, represented hope.

The second of our pictures comes from somebody from very different times. It was drawn by a Lapford School pupil to mark the Queen's 90th Birthday and was used as a poster for our village celebrations. In the eyes of a child in 2016, the kindly Grandma-like figure still had meaning. It is written on her dress: "Love".


The Lapford Gardening Club welcomes new members and meets on the second Tuesday of the month at The ARK.

A QUICK TOMATO SAUCE FOR PASTA

medium sized onion and cook until soft in two tablespoons of olive oil, without colouring. Add a crushed clove of garlic and 1 1/2lbs (750g) of chopped tomatoes. Bring to the boil and then simmer gently for ten minutes.

Allow to cool, then rub through a sieve to remove the onion, tomato skins and seeds. Return the puree to a saucepan and simmer for a further five minutes, season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. This can be frozen and used in stews, casseroles, and with pasta dishes.


Ruth then has to battle with Timothy and also the evil spirit as she learns all about her ancestor's life.



THE PROCLAMATION OF THE ACCESSION

On the Church Green, Lapford

Led by the Chairman of Lapford Parish Council, Councillor Peter Heal Friday 16th September 2022, 4.00pm

The National Anthem

God save our gracious King! Long live our noble King! God save the King. Send him victorious, Happy and glorious, Long to reign over us. God save the King.

Three Cheers for His Majesty the King

Opening Prayer

We come together this afternoon following the passing of our late Sovereign Queen Elizabeth the Second. Our sadness at this time is shared by people across the globe, as we remember with affection and gratitude the lifetime of service given by our longest reigning monarch. The basis on which our monarchy is built has ensured that through the centuries the crown has passed in an unbroken line of succession. Today's ceremony marks the formal Proclamation to the people of Lapford of the new King's reign. In accordance with this ancient tradition our country's flag has been raised to the mast head where it will remain until the end of the ceremony.

The Accession Council made an order requiring High Sheriffs to cause the Proclamation to be read in the areas of their jurisdiction. The High Sheriff of Devon discharged that duty on the 11th of September and it is my humble duty to bring the exact words of the Proclamation to the people of Lapford today.

The Proclamation of the Accession

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth the Second of Blessed and Glorious Memory, by whose Decease the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland is solely and rightfully come to The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George.

We therefore, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of the Realm and Members of the House of Commons, together with the other members of Her late Majesty's Privy Council and representatives of the Realms and Territories, Aldermen and Citizens of London, and others, do now with one voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart publish and Proclaim The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George is now by the Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord, Charles the Third. By the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of His other Realms and Territories, King Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith, to whom we do acknowledge all Faith and Obedience with humble Affection; Beseeching God by whom Kings and Queens do reign to bless His Majesty with long and happy years to reign over us.

Given at St James's Palace this tenth day of September in the year of Our Lord two thousand and twenty two.

God Save the King

Response God Save the King

Ladies and Gentlemen, thank you for attending this historic ceremony today. When you go home tell those that were unable to attend what you have seen and heard here today. These are indeed truly historic times. Many of us have never seen the like before and some of us may never see it again. I shall now ask that the Union Flag be returned to half mast so that we can continue to mark with respect the passing of our late, Great, Sovereign, Queen Elizabeth the Second.

BELLS AND FLAGS

For centuries, the bells of Lapford have been rung by a village band of ringers to mark occasions of national importance. So too have the long stairs to the tower roof been climbed over generations to mark such occasions through the flying of a flag. As a matter of historical record, this is how the sad death of Queen Elizabeth II and the Proclamation of the new King were marked in the village.

8th September 2022

The flag was flown half-mast within minutes of the 6.30pm announcement of the Queen's passing. At just past 7pm a ringer tolled the tenor bell full-circle 96 times to mark each year of her life.

9th September 2022

12 noon. The bells were rung half-muffled by the local band, coinciding with a the tolling and ringing of bells across the country. The ringers rang in a special way ("whole pull and stand") - a haunting sound reserved for sad occasions of importance. Again, this was performed 96 times.

6pm. Those returning from work would have heard the bells rung half-muffled for a further hour. Touches of two of England most traditional methods were rung: Stedman and Grandsire. This was the first occasion this has ever been done by a local Lapford band in the history of the bells. A special mark of respect.

10th September 2022

The flag was raised at 10.30am for the national Proclamation of the King and returned to half-mast the following day.

16th September 2022

The flag was raised for the local Proclamation of the King, and returned to half-mast immediately afterwards.

BOOKS FOR CHRISTMAS

all the others combined. But a book is a perfect gift, the perfect thing to lose yourself in. And this list is neither inclusive: nor selective. It's a guide. Let's begin with Fiction: Fairy Tale by Stephen King (6th September) looks to be more fantasy than horror, but I still think he's an underrated writer, a satirist of American life. Two Rivers (9th September) is the second in Anne Cleeves' Heron's Cry series, set in North Devon. This one sees DI Matthew Venn solving a murder at an artist's commune.

The Bullet That Missed (15th September) is the third in Richard Osman's Thursday Murder Club series. I found the first amiable, but inherently unsatisfying. But you can't deny their massive popularity. Essex Dogs (15th September) is the historian Dan Jones' first novel, about the infamous regiment during The Hundred Years War. Expect male bonding, blood, archery and cries of "ARRR!" A Heart Full of Headstones by Ian Rankin (13th October) sees Rebus on trial, but presumably still both laconic and sardonic in his 24th case.

Finally, The Satsuma Paradox (27th October) is the debut of Bob Mortimer. Trainee solicitor Gary Thorn meets the woman of his dreams in a pub, falls in love, but can't remember anything other than the eponymous self-help book she was reading.

In Non-Fiction, we'll begin with Lucy Worsley's biography of Agatha Christie. A Very Elusive Woman (8th September). She'll discuss the queen of crime's best-selling career, but also her love of surfing, psychology and fast cars. Undoctored (15th September) is the sequel to Adam's Kay's This Is Going to Hurt; a book as popular on TV and stage as it was in print.

Terry Pratchett: A Life with Footnotes (29th September) is a long overdue biography of a much-missed talent by Rob Wilkins. A Pocket Full of Happiness (29th September) is painted as both Richard E Grant's autobiography and a self-help book on how to cope with the joy and pain of being alive. On a similar note, Madly, Deeply: The Alan Rickman Diaries (4th October) is edited by Alan Taylor and Emma Thompson. It promises to be as impish and as arch as the man himself.

Footballers used to produce awful books; this has improved in recent years. Jordan Henderson: The Autobiography (27th October) is, as you'd expect a book by Liverpool's Stakhanovite midfielder. Surrender (1st November) should be the factual big-hitter, an autobiography by U2's diminutive demigod Bono. Later on that month though, is Prince Harry's autobiography (24th November). Surely to prove as controversial is Britney Spears' autobiography, but there is no definite date (nor title) for its publication.

In *Miscellaneous, One* (1st September) is a book of recipes by Jamie Oliver showing us recipes that can be cooked in one pan. Presumably these will "raise things to a whole new level"? Let's Do Dinner (9th September) is another cookbook by Anthony Porowski from Queer Eye, which I predict will involve "parstah" and "origanoh". More More (15th September) by Dave Grohl, sorry Laurence Llewelyn-Bowen will show the cautious reader how to make your home fabulous, darling... and live with it. Menopausing (15th September) sees Davina McCall and Dr Naomi Potter continuing to make something that's part of every woman's life an open conversation.

Despite the title, Is This a Cookbook? (13th October) it definitely is. Heston Blumenthal treads the same path as Nigella Lawson and Mrs Beaton - recipes with hints, notes and tips. However, this one has illustrations by comic artist Dave McKean. Finally, Tom Daley is Devon's nicest man. Made With Love (27th October) offers encouragement, patterns and tips for the amateur as much as the casual knitter.





LAPFORD COMMUNITY PRIMARY SCHOOL UPDATE



We've had a wonderful start to the term. The children have arrived back after a long summer break looking very smart and have settled straight into their learning.



Over the summer we were relieved to finally say goodbye to the condemned classroom that was occupying some of the playground space. This will allow us to significantly extend our Early Years outside

area and provide many more opportunities for our youngest children to explore their learning outside of the classroom. Unfortunately, the area needs a little more work before the children can start using it, but the plans are in place and the area should be ready after half term.

Pupil voice is very important to us at Lapford and this year we are starting a School Council. Their job will be to meet with me each month and feedback views of the children to the staff and they will also help to organise fundraising events throughout the year. Last week the children voted in their classes to decide who they would like to represent them, and we were delighted to be able to hand out School Council badges to our elected representatives in assembly. Well done to Austin, Billy, Danny, Noah, Risu, Jacob, Bonnie and Aubree who I am confident will be excellent role models for their peers.

Our newly formed Council met this week to feedback their ideas for school improvement. They have some big plans so watch this space!



CITIZENS ADVICE, TORRIDGE, NORTH, MID AND WEST DEVON

Here is a variation on a very topical theme – stretching the budget!

"My oldest child is starting school this month and, with uniforms and PE kits, the costs are already mounting. The school we got into isn't within walking distance so I now need to budget for bus money five days a week too. We're already pretty stretched so I'm not sure how to cover these new costs. Is there any extra help I can get?"



The start of a school year can be tough for many people whose budgets are stretched, especially now so you are by no means alone in your worries. The good news is that there is help available. A good place

to start is the Citizens Advice website www.citizensadvice.org.uk where there is lots of information on the support you may be able to get for school related costs. If you're claiming benefits it's worth checking if you can get extra help for things like school lunches, transport and uniforms. If you are not claiming benefits it may be helpful to use our benefits calculator to see if you are, in fact, entitled to make a claim. At Citizens Advice Torridge, North, Mid & West Devon (CA TNMWD) we can also advise on this and help you to claim if necessary. Simply ring our local, free AdviceLine on 0808 27 87 999 or visit our website www.ruraldevoncab.org.uk and click on 'Get Advice.' Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 automatically get free school meals if you are claiming benefits. For older children you can apply for free school meals if you claim certain types of benefits; the full list is on the Citizens Advice website but it includes Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support.

You mentioned you are worried about transport costs. For children aged 5 to 16 your local education authority might be able to offer free or discounted transport if you're not able to walk to the school. Contact them directly to find out how they can support you. Your local education authority might also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs if you are on a low income. You're probably considered to be on a low income if you get means tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. There are also some local charitable schemes that can help – check with your school as they will usually know if these kinds of schemes are in your area. Schools can also sometimes advise on finding cheap or free second hand uniforms.

If your child is disabled or has a health condition you can also claim Disability Living Allowance which is not means tested.

A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it is important to remember that help is available. Remember, CA TNMWD can be contacted on their free, local AdviceLine 0808 27 87 999 or access our website to search for information to help you. www.ruraldevoncab.org.uk

As you can imagine, CA TNMWD are experiencing an increase in demand for our services. Volunteers are key to helping us deliver. Volunteering is an interesting and worthwhile experience. We are a very friendly organisation and provide full, ongoing training. 

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, SEPTEMBER 2022

Please note this is a summary of the main points of interest. A copy of the draft minutes will be made available on the Council website, www.lapfordparishcouncil.org.uk and on the notice boards in the Orchard Centre and in The ARK.

The Parish Council met on 7th September 2022 in the Victory Hall. Five members of the public attended.

- Representatives from Lapford Football Club attended the meeting and confirmed that the Club was still in existence although no teams were playing this year. The Parish Council would continue to work with the Football Club in obtaining finance for improvements to their facilities.
- The Orchard Centre was being looked at by a Council working party to look at improving the facility and increasing its use. Councillors are acutely aware of the need to make proper provision for the Village Archive and to ensure that the Post Office service is maintained.
- The decision to repair the Village Clock was made in August, but subject to a revised price being acceptable. A new quotation was received adding £500 to the original price but the Parish Council reaffirmed the decision to have the work done.
- The Platinum Jubilee celebration events made a small surplus of £115 which would be reserved.
- The Parish Council is working closely with the Lapford Youth and Playing Field Trust and Mid Devon District Council to sort out the ownership of the playing field and play area to improve the facilities there.
- The Parish Council has appointed a new Internal Auditor for the current financial year and beyond and it will be an specialist Parish Council Accountancy Company based in Hampshire, Mulberry & Co.
- The planning application for the Church Green / Lower Town Place bank has been submitted as a joint exercise between HOLD and the Church Green Trustees. When approval is received, the work will be able to commence.



LAPFORD VILLAGE ARCHIVE

Background

The Village Archive consists of a collection of documents and artefacts mostly donated by local people and organisations, though some purchases have been and are made using income generated by the publication of the Lapford Lookout. It is mainly held in a dedicated, locked cupboard at the Orchard Centre, Lapford, with an overspill facility locked in a container on Lower Town Place.

The Archive is the responsibility of the Lapford Project 2000 Committee which also publishes the Lapford Lookout. Responsibility for the Village Archive means keeping Archive items safe by storing and cataloguing them appropriately whilst managing access to the public. Day to day management is in the hands of the Voluntary Archivist and helpers. All archive items are catalogued.

Public Access to the Archive

The Archive collection has been established to conserve and keep the items it collects and to enable members of the public to understand, research and appreciate the rich history of the Village and Parish of Lapford. This is achieved through public exhibitions of Archive material and/or discreet aspects of local history and through public access to the collection. Some material is accessible on-line, see lapfordhistory.co.uk. Due to the uniqueness of most items, although their monetary value is in most cases negligible, borrowing and use for research must be carefully managed. The Archive is open to the public every Tuesday morning between 10-30 and 12-30, and at other times for individuals or groups by arrangement with the Voluntary Archivist.

Using the Collection

Items in the collection can be seen, read, researched, and used in the Orchard Centre building, at the times listed above. They may be scanned or photographed and can be used as part of personal research and /or publication projects, though it would be appreciated if the Village Archive could be acknowledged as the source of such material. Members of the public wishing to remove articles/documents from the Archive for further research away from the building must do so by arrangement with the Voluntary Archivist or LP2K Committee member. Each borrowing will be logged on the form provided, as will the return of the item, and permission is down to the discretion of the Voluntary Archivist or Committee member. Permission may be withheld if the article is deemed too fragile or precious to be removed, or for any other reason.

The Village Archive is always pleased to receive items that may be of interest for future generations and researchers. Documents/ photographs can be scanned or copied for the Archive if owners wish to retain the originals.

Wisdom belongs to the aged and understanding to the old. Job 12:12. An elderly lady says, "One benefit of living so long is sharing what I've learned. So make my day by letting me share three secrets that could make your life better." Then she offers us some great counsel. "Time is precious so don't waste it."

After my husband died, I was staying with friends. One evening they started arguing and eventually stopped speaking to one another. Now I know arguments happen (my husband and I had several very loud ones) but, at that moment, I understood as never before that the time we have together is precious. Don't waste it by bickering about things that won't matter when your loved one is gone. Do everything you can to live in harmony and show your love. Why? Because no matter how long you have together, it's never enough. *You are making memories; make them good ones*.

Looking back, I thank God for so many unforgettable moments. The day my husband died we kissed (as we always did when we parted), at noon. By five-thirty that evening he was dead. I've always been glad about that final kiss. So create memories – not regrets! It's not what happens, but how you respond that counts.

Every day holds new challenges that will test your love and resolve. You have the power through Christ to make each test an occasion for growth. Life is full of seemingly unpleasant events. Try to handle them in such a way that when you are old, you will be able to look back and say, "Thank you, God, for that experience, it will help me grow." That's how to live wisely and well.

I've just re-read "It's not what happens, but how we respond that counts." I'm listening to the final journey of the Queen to lying in state. We knew it would happen one day, but I think we hoped she would last forever. 


