GEORGE TUCKER RECALLS GROWING UP IN THE VILLAGE OF LAPFORD, NEAR CREDITON

(Published in Devon Today December 2006)

I was born at home in Lapford, where I still live, in 1928 and I'm the third generation of my family to live in the village. We lived at Blackberry Gate, which is a house at the top of the village, built by my grandfather, Tommy. Some of the building materials came from some cottages across the road which had burnt down.

Lapford was a lot smaller then, and everyone knew everybody else. There were a lot more shops in the village, with two baker's shops, a butcher's shop and a post office. Now there's one shop and a garage at the bottom of the village on the main road to Barnstaple.

I went to Lapford School until I was 14. When it closed a new one was built in the village, on Eastington Lane. I went there to finish my schooling, and it's now the village primary school. In my day, the children who went away to school went to the grammar school in Crediton, but I stayed in Lapford. It was very nice, just an ordinary school.

We made our own amusements in those days. We made our own go-karts and would race them through the village. You couldn't do that today, but there wasn't very much traffic then.

At Christmas, everyone went to church so it was quite a sociable occasion, but you didn't get as many presents as children do today. I remember getting oranges, but not much else. We used also to keep our own geese in the garden and we grew most of our own vegetables. We used to have a goose for Christmas.

One Christmas we had a goose that wasn't big enough to eat, so we kept her and called her Lucy. She used to follow my younger sister around. By Easter, she was big enough so we all ate her - apart from my sister.

When I left school, I worked with my grandfather and father as a builder. My grandfather had his own firm, Tommy Tucker & Sons, and I worked there until the 1960's. It was quite hard work, but mostly local. We used to have a pony and cart. The pony was called Topsy, and he lived in a field down the lane. Later on we had the first lorry in the area. After my grandfather died, the business was run by my father and my uncle. After they retired, I worked for a chap called Kitch Pike, who still lives in the village. I also did some carpentry and plumbing work.

I became a bell ringer at St Thomas of Canterbury Church in the village before the end of the Second World War. I took it up because they were short of ringers. The bells weren't allowed to be rung during the war because of the fear of invasion. The bells would only have been rung as a warning if the enemy had landed, so I learned to ring them with the clappers tied to muffle the sound. There were two or three of us learning the ropes at that time.

There were a lot of dances at the village hall during the war, and after, and a big party when the war ended. There was a searchlight post in the village, and during the war the village hall was used as a mess. If a German plane came over, they would put the searchlight on. I can remember hearing the Exeter Blitz in 1942. My mother's father was in hospital in Exeter when that was going on, and she was very worried.

I stayed at home until my mother and father died.

GEORGE, BY MARGARET TUCKER (SISTER IN LAW)

George was a very dear brother-in-law. He was born in Lapford, and had an elder sister Margaret, brother Edwin Ted, and younger sister Beatrice. I have happy memories of holidays we shared in Italy, southern Spain and Sand Bay, Weston Super Mare. We once went to America, and George had a great time in the Casino in the hotel. He was lucky and won enough on the slots to buy himself two new shirts in a shopping outlet! He came in almost every Sunday until Covid to lunch with us. We were all very close. He really loved my great grandson Jack and grandchildren Ian, and Jessica. He loved children.

He went to the Primary School in Lapford, leaving I think when he was 14, as it was back then, and worked first for the family firm Tommy Tucker and Sons (Tommy was his grandfather), then for Kitch Pike until he retired. He learnt everything in the building trade, bricklaying, plumbing etc. He was very, very skilled. He was a great gardener, tilling many runner beans and veg on the Plat, opposite Blackberry Gate.

The Church played a great part in his life, going back to when Revd David White, was there and before. He was, I believe, a church warden. He was a bell ringer, from about 12 years old, and he and mother used to organise the annual ringers' trip (I used to type out their itinerary). Ringers David and Stella Drew were great friends with him. He was the ringers' captain for many years. Besides winding the clock on the church until it went electric, he also always hung the flag on the bell tower, plus he used to cut the church grass until his knees gave out and he could no longer do it, or get up the tower. He also dug the graves for Andy White.

After Blackberry Gate was sold, we helped him to find the bungalow in Prospect Way, and went with him to buy his new furniture. We organised his 90th Birthday which we held at our home. We invited his relations, and a number of his old friends in Lapford including Canon Michael and Sandie. He also played in a local skittles league and darts as well.

He had two nephews, David Smith and Richard Webb. We shall miss him so much.

Out of respect for George the village bells that he rang for 75 years were sounded half-muffled for his funeral and the flag he had so often raised was flown at half-mast.

(WILLIAM) GEORGE TUCKER 1928-2023

For decades George Tucker was part of the fabric of Lapford, providing services for the village week in, week out. Things that went unthanked. Things that went unnoticed. He never sought recognition. He happily, unassumingly got on with the job, and he liked it that way. But George's quiet passing should not go without a word of praise and gratitude.

So, thank you George ...

for the years of mowing and tending the churchyard;

for the 75 years of service you gave as a bell ringer;

for the thousands of changes that you called as tower captain; for the hundreds of weekly ascents to oil the bells, 'til your knees could take no more;

for the sweat you exerted winding the clock and keeping it accurate to the second (Lapford's time was your time);

for raising the church flag for decades of village festivity, royal ascensions and times of national mourning;

for the tonnes of soil you shifted giving villagers a last resting place;

and, for the thousands of bricks you laid and your hand in building the village we know today.

Lapford Weather Review

LAPFORD WEATHER AUGUST 2023

Overall the monthly temperature remained close to average, a little cooler by day and a little milder at night than the norm. Rainfall was two thirds of average.

The warmest day was the 23rd with a maximum of 25.0° C and the coolest was the 27^{th} with achieved 15.8° C. The coolest night was on the 25^{th} with a minimum of 9.1° C. The lowest grass temperature was 3.6° C on the 6^{th} .

Total rainfall was 51.6 mm, the wettest day being the 30^{th} with 10.8 mm.

The windiest day was the 18th with a gust of 31 m.p.h.


So she persuades her four friends to commit a crime with the aim of ending up in prison.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, JULY 2023

Please note this is a summary of the main points of interest. A copy of the draft minutes will be made available on the Council website, <u>www.lapfordparishcouncil.org.uk</u> and on the notice boards in the Orchard Centre and in The ARK.

The Parish Council met on 18th July 2023 in the Orchard Centre. These notes summarise the issues discussed in the meeting.

The Post Office attendance times in the Orchard Centre were to reduce, with no visit on Wednesdays and starting later on the other two days (Monday and Friday) with hours being 9.30 to 12 noon

A Lapford Neighbourhood Plan was to be started and the whole community would be invited to take part.

The requirements for making the Orchard Centre more suitable were agreed, involving extensive Fire Regulation and other Health and Safety work and the outside was being painted with a new sign installed.

A Lapford Facebook information page had been set up and was already getting favourable feedback.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES, AUGUST 2023

The Parish Council met on 15th August 2023 in the Orchard Centre. These notes summarise the issues discussed in the meeting.

The Orchard Centre public toilet would need to be locked overnight for the future, in order to counter vandalism. The precise arrangements still had to be decided, but a timed lock was being considered.

The red Telephone Box is to be left where it is and reutilised as a book exchange point/swap shop, perhaps in conjunction with The Ark. Details still had to be arranged.

A letter would be sent to the County Council Highways Director offering a possible solution to the Highways repairs needed over the bridges. The reaction to this would determine whether the matter would be taken further.

The Neighbourhood Plan process had been started with the plan area being advertised currently. Assuming that this was accepted, the next stage would be to arrange a public meeting inviting anyone with an interest in being part of it.

A Lapford Volunteering Day would be arranged for the 14th October 2023, which would again be open to all to take part with the potential for bacon sandwiches and tea for the workers.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL -LAPFORD NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Lapford Parish Council is looking to the whole community to draw up a Neighbourhood Plan and is looking for volunteers to help with this. To avoid confusion, the explanation of what this can do is laid out below.



WHAT IS A NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN?

A Neighbourhood Plan is a legally binding Planning Document which determines planning policies just for Lapford.

When Planning Applications are considered it sits alongside the Mid Devon Local Plan and influences the decisions made by the district council.

It has to comply with some basic rules, but within that a Neighbourhood Plan can seriously affect the future of the community in the following ways,

- Environment & Biodiversity including Climate Change
- Jobs, Businesses & Enterprise
- Open Space Protection
- Sports & Play Facilities
- Village Facilities
- School
- Highways, Buses and Trains
- Housing Allocations & Affordable Housing
- Local Characteristics
- Assets of Community Value

In order to enable the community to help provide improvements, a **Community Action Plan** will be developed. Funding for some of this can come from potential future developments using,

- Section 106 funds, negotiated through Mid Devon District Council, and
- Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) 25% of CIL collected from developments within its area result from having a made Neighbourhood Plan in place.

There is a lot of work involved and a great deal that can be achieved, so please think about what you could add to the story.

The Parish Council will shortly be announcing the date for a public meeting to explain further what is involved and how everyone can help.



HIGHWAYS, POTHOLES AND STUFF

This is a summary of a recent meeting between Parish Councillors, Steve Tucker (Area DCC Highways Officer), County Cllr Margaret Squires and District Cllr Steve Keable. A number of points relating to the state of local roads and other matters were raised as summarised below:

- The Highways budget is now held centrally so each area officer must bid/argue for revenue for their areas. Those arguments are put up against each other to decide priority.
- All roads are inspected annually, and defects logged on the system. A roads and gritting routes are inspected monthly.
- A trial is to run where Area Officers can log defects via an iPad as they spot them, rather than relying on the same system of reporting as used by the public.
- Policy is centred around saving money versus the priorities and logistics of repair work.
- Identified defects on A roads and gritting routes should be made good within 24 hours; within 6 weeks on minor roads.
- Roads are categorised as 1 motorways down to 12green lanes.
- A road defect must have a 40mm lip and a pothole must be at least 300mm wide to qualify for repair.
- The road over the bridges coming into Lapford from the A377 has no dedicated footway and is therefore categorised as a carriageway rather than a pedestrian route.
- Steve Tucker has put all the defects in Lapford's roads between the A377 and Barris Corner into the system for repair twice. The request has been rejected twice but he will continue his efforts.
- The steep drop from the A377 to the river on the left hand side travelling towards Crediton which was exposed by the removal of trees some time ago is considered safe as there is no recorded data to indicate otherwise.
- Other matters discussed included the lack of fencing by the river bridge, flooding across the A377 causing icy conditions in winter, water leaking from manhole covers, and the need for more grit bins.

As a result of this meeting the Parish Clerk has written to Meg Booth (DCC Director of Climate Change, Environment and Transport) re the state of the road over the bridges and the urgency for repairs to be put in place.

THOUGHTS FROM THE ARK



Putting others first.

Ralph Waldo Emmerson said, "There is

no limit to what can be accomplished if it doesn't matter who gets the credit." Most people know about Isaac Newton's famed encounter with a falling apple; how he introduced the law of universal gravitation and revolutionised astronomical studies. But few people know that had it not been for a man called Edmond Halley, the world would never have heard of Newton. Halley was the one who urged Newton to think through his original theories, corrected his mathematical mistakes and formulated geometrical figures to help support his discoveries. It was Halley who persuaded a hesitant Newton to write his great work The Mathematical Principles of Natural Philosophy. And it was Halley who edited and supervised it's publication and financed its printing, even though Newton was wealthier and could better have afforded the cost. Historians have called Halley's affiliation with Newton one of the most selfless cases in science. Newton began almost immediately to reap the rewards of prominence, but Halley received little credit. He did use the principles Newton established to forecast the orbit and return of a comet that would later bear his name. But since Halley's comet returns only every seventy-six years, relatively few people still hear his name.

However, Halley didn't care who got the credit as long as the cause of science was advanced. He personified what it means to live by this scriptural principle: Be devoted to one another in love. Honour one another above yourselves. Anytime you get to put others first and yourself second, grab it with both hands and run with it. Notes from UCB Word for Today.

I guess you could say that's what The ARK is about - putting others first with the Foodbank and being a volunteer in the Cafe. It's important to remember too, that ARK stands for Acts of Random Kindness, helping where and when we can. We have been sending items regularly to Ukraine via a lorry that goes from Exmouth. Serving in the community doesn't always mean just locally, it can go further afield and, with the community's help, we can keep doing just that.

Seeing the good and talent in people, then encouraging that gift is so rewarding and we really don't always need the credit, if we've done our part. Just to see it develop is reward in itself.

As you are probably aware the village has a Public Access Defibrillator ready for use and located on the wall of the Orchard Centre. This machine, which is very simple to use, can greatly assist in saving the life of a person suffering a cardiac emergency (Cardiac Arrest). However, without someone giving the patient CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) while someone fetches the Defibrillator, their chances of survival are greatly reduced.

FULL FIBRE BROADBAND OPPORTUNITY IN LAPFORD

Chance of ultrafast full fibre broadband for people living in the Lapford exchange area, including Lapford, Coldridge & Nymet Rowland. Openreach is urging residents in the Lapford exchange area to get behind a bid to bring ultrafast, ultra-reliable full fibre broadband to local homes and businesses.

If enough people pledge to sign up, residents will join more than 245,000 homes and businesses across Devon who already have access to full fibre broadband on the Openreach network. Full fibre technology provides more reliable, resilient, and future-proof internet connectivity, meaning faster speeds and fewer faults. Having ultrafast, full fibre broadband installed can add value to properties, which is more appealing for prospective buyers; both Rightmove and Zoopla allow house hunters to check online for broadband speeds at properties on the market. Residents can check if they qualify and pledge their voucher on the community website - https://www.openreach.com/connectmycommunity.

Funding through the Government's Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme and the deployment of new broadband signal boosting technology, which can extend the reach of the full fibre network, means thousands more remote rural communities are now within reach of the ultrafast technology. Openreach identified the Lapford exchange area as being a strong contender for Full Fibre and is urging local people to take the next step by applying for and pooling together free Government Gigabit Vouchers to help fund the build. The project needs 240 homes and businesses to sign up.

Using the vouchers, which don't cost residents anything, enables Openreach to work with local communities to build a customised, co-funded network. The vouchers can be combined to extend the ultrafast, ultra-reliable network to premises in outlying rural areas which won't be covered by private investment. More details can be found on the Gigabit Voucher website - https://gigabitvoucher.culture.gov.uk/

Once the target for the scheme is reached, residents need to ensure they then validate their vouchers with the Government so that Openreach can confirm that building work can get underway. Residents are asked to commit to ordering a full fibre service from a provider of their choice for at least 12 months once the new network is available and confirm they are connected. Openreach has an open access network, so customers can choose from a variety of broadband providers, including Sky, Talk Talk, EE, Vodafone, BT and others. The full list of broadband providers offering fibre can be found on the Openreach website - https://www.openreach.com/fibre-broadband/fttp-providers

A team from Openreach will be visiting the area over the coming weeks and meeting with residents and handing out leaflets, to explain more about the scheme and the benefits.







THE PARSON & THE PORCUPINE



Tales of Lapford's infamous Rector, Jack Radford, have been recounted in numerous books and journals. It is widely believed that 'Parson Jack' committed at least two murders in the village. He got away with murder, but he did spend time in prison for striking a police constable four times in the parsonage yard, and also for attempting to knife a tollgate keeper who had refused him free passage. **But what was it that had ignited his rage?**

New research reveals the part that his father, Rev William Radford (Rector of Lapford 1779-1824) may have played.

The Parson and the Porcupine can be found in ten parts on lapfordhistory.co.uk (under Articles). It looks at the war of words exchanged in the 1820s between William Radford and one of the most famous men of the day, the satirist and political reformer William Cobbett (who wrote under the pen name of Peter Porcupine).

Go back to a time before Parson Jack, when the cure of Lapford souls was in the hands of a man labelled a blasphemer, a blaggard and a dealer in Billingsgate scurrility — a time when trampled down villagers began to fight back against the corruptness of the British system.

Cobbett's vehement outing of William Radford as a scoundrel begins a trail of investigation into the parson's troubles and temperament. Actions in the last years of his life may well have been responsible for igniting his son's anger ... and so began Parson Jack's notorious torment of Lapford.

In the early 1940's a soldier walked into Lapford Stores and purchased nine postcards of the village. He had recently been stationed at the military base in the village centre and was keen to write home to describe his new surroundings. He pencilled notes on the back of each card. More than eighty years later, the postcards still reside in Lapford (in the Village Archive). They provide a fascinating outside view of Lapford at a time before the village's post war expansion.

CHESTNUT TREE

Those of you who have passed the Church Green and Village Hall in recent months can't but help to have noticed the declining health of the old Chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter. It's bark is peeling; it looks most unhappy.

The Church Green Trustees consulted Tim Jarrett from Mid Devon District Council about the state of the chestnut tree.

Unfortunately the tree is dying and there are signs of disease. The Church Green Trustees believe the best thing to do would be to cut the tree down.

There has been a suggestion that the wood could be relocated to public land to decompose.


