- * The accounts, showing a balance of £954.56, were accepted.
- * The officers were re-elected to serve for the next twelve months: Chair Steve Fletcher, Vice-Chair Roy Andrews, Secretary Sue Briant-Evans, Treasurer the Parish Clerk.

Sad note that the chestnut tree by the Melissa Lake shelter is now dead. Arrangements are in hand to remove it. More cheerfully the wood will be transported to the school to be used by the children in the outdoor area.

LAPFORD'S NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Back in October a public consultation was held in the Victory Hall inviting people to express their views about many aspects of our village and to encourage thinking about what might happen in the future.

One hundred people attended, leaving four hundred or so comments. A team from Devon Communities Together has been analysing those comments and compressing them into an easily digestible and readable form.

It will form the basis of a questionnaire being developed to go in paper form to every household in the Parish so enabling people to record their own thoughts and opinions. The questionnaire will also be available to return electronically.

Results will form a basis for the next steps in the Neighbourhood Planning process.

Lapford Weather November 2024

Milder and slightly drier than average. The first half was very dry and mild, the second half very changeable, sometimes cold and often very wet.

The warmest day was the 23rd with a balmy maximum of 16.1°C and the coolest was the 21st with a maximum of just 3.3°C.

The coldest night was on the 20th with a minimum of -1.7°C and a grass frost of -7.3°C. The 21st was quite an interesting day with a period of quite heavy wet snow through the morning leaving a covering on the ground of a few centimetres. This was the first lying snow in November since 2005 here in Lapford.

Total rainfall (including melted snow) was 99.0 mm. and the wettest day was the 23rd with a fall of 25.8 mm. Despite the wet second half to the month the total was still a little less than the November average.

The windiest day was the 23rd with a gust of 49 m.p.h. This was storm Bert.

The autumn as a whole was milder and wetter than average.

Last year, we flagged up most pre -Christmas topics; how to budget Torridge, North, Mid & West Devon and not get carried away, being mindful of energy costs and priority payments, being aware of

Up to the end of November last year, we had helped 10,681 people with 37,067 problems resulting in an uplift in household income of £9,903,474 since 1st. April 2024. We shall continue to do what we have always done; give free, impartial, non-judgemental advice and help in total confidence to whoever needs it. We will also continue to campaign for social justice lobbying to make society fairer. The same as we have done for the past 85 years.

LAPFORD PARISH COUNCIL NOTES -10TH DECEMBER 2024 MEETING

- Compliments were received from members of the public regarding the Christmas Tree.
- Submissions had been sent to DCC by the Parish Council and Steve Keable, MDDC, regarding the transport review.
- Open Reach fibre broadband installation is continuing, there is still time to register your interest.
- There are two vacancies for councillors, which will be revisited in the new year.
- A bus shelter has been installed at the top of Highfield, and is being well used.
- An update was received from the Celebrations Committee there will be a fund raising quiz on 31st January to support the VE day event in May 2025.
- Updates from the emergency plan committee.
- Road warden equipment grant agreed, and will be ordered once funds received and a storage solution found.
- The Community Church is hoping to upgrade the projector and sound system in the hall. The Parish Council will consider making a grant towards this if it can be used by the whole community.
- A grant application was received from Lapford Voluntary Car Aid. This was declined at this stage, as sufficient reserves are held. To be reviewed in six months.
- An informed discussion took pace regarding the budget for 2025/2026, and the required precept. An increase of £3k was agreed. For a band D property this will be approx. £1.20 per month.
- A draft lease for the toddler play area has been received. MDDC to be contacted to find out if this can be changed from 25 to 50 years, without delaying its set up.
- In the meantime, a licence will be obtained from MDDC to enable new toddler play equipment to be arranged, subject to MDDC agreement to use the s106 funds for this purpose. A reply is awaited
- The quote from Kompan was accepted for the play equipment. The shortfall of circa £6k will be funded by the precept increase, and reserves.
- The Neighbourhood Plan data has now been analysed, details have been received from DCT. The information is currently on display in The Ark. A Volunteers event is being arranged if you would like to be involved, please let us know. The information will also be distributed to every household, hopefully towards the end of January.
- A member of the pubic had asked if a memorial for Derek Pleace could be placed on 'Derek's Wall' between the Church Green and Lower Town Place.
- As a mark of respect, it was agreed to have the Christmas tree lit for the funeral of Derek Pleace.

ST JOHN PASSION IN AID OF SECOND SIGHT

A special performance of the St John Passion will be performed in Crediton Parish Church on Saturday 15th February at 6pm in aid of Second Sight, a charity which works to eradicate and prevent blindness in Bihar, North East India.

The performance of J.S Bach's magnificent choral work has been organised by local music teacher, Francisca van Holthoon, who has brought together musicians from Devon and the Netherlands, where she grew up.

'We have a wonderful choir of seasoned singers, an orchestra and a team of soloists who are all willing to perform for free, so that all proceeds can go to Second Sight, a zero overheads, UK based charity I have supported for 15 years', explained Francisca.


'The Crediton based solicitor's firm Gilbert Stephens has generously offered to contribute towards the expenses'.

The St John Passion tells the story of Jesus' capture, trial and crucifixion as recounted in the Gospel of St John. It was written by J.S Bach during his first year as director of church music in Leipzig and was first performed more than 300 years ago, on 7 April 1724.

Tickets are £12 per person (children/students free) and are available here www.ticketsource.co.uk/creditonartscentre/st-john-passion or on the door.

All proceeds will be used to cure blind people in Bihar, where £20 is all it takes to cure one patient blind with cataracts. This includes transportation to and from hospital.

LAPFORD BOOK CLUB REVIEW


"How to Measure a Cow" by Margaret Forster

The title of November's Book Club read might lead one to think that this book has a rural feel to it, but far from it. 'Measuring a cow' is part of a meaningful conversation between two of the book's main characters, Sarah and Nancy, but the book is set mainly in the grim, dark back streets of Workington, where Sarah arrives after sticking a pin in a map.

Why she moved her life from London to Workington in this fashion is revealed very slowly as the book progresses, but from the outset we understand that Sarah is running from something awful and needs to be where no-one knows or recognises her - and that her name is, in fact, Tara. Tara has been a highly-qualified research chemist but is now struggling to build herself a new persona and life; she is determined to be invisible to others. Her new job in a factory is mind-numbing but nonetheless she wants to live alone and do without friendship so she does not speak to or fraternise with her co-workers, and she has completely cut herself off from the friends and family left behind down South.

Sarah/Tara's attempt to lead an isolated and low-profile life in Workington is gradually thwarted by overtures of friendship

from her neighbour, Nancy, an equally isolated older woman, and also by the slow resurgence of Sarah/Tara's own psyche. Neither woman wants to allow anyone to get close to her or to divulge anything about herself and so the meetings between the two are rather uncomfortable to read. The two eventually reach a sort of familiarity, but this does not last.



Sarah/Tara eventually feels compelled to tell Nancy the truth about her past and then moves on, leaving Nancy as we found her, alone.

As the story slowly unravels it seems that whatever Sarah/ Tara is running from really must be truly dreadful. The truth, when revealed, was generally agreed by Book Club members to be a bit of an anti-climax, and the ending of the story leaves the reader hanging, with many issues unresolved.

"How to Measure a Cow' is a good read and well-written and composed, but it is a little slow and depressing and therefore might not be to everyone's taste. In the book's favour, however, is the fact that all of us read and finished it, which is not always the case!

VICTORY HALL NEWS



The usage of the Victory Hall has slowly been improving since Covid caused its shutdown for months at a time, although it has still not returned to pre-pandemic levels.

The Victory Hall management committee and trustees are aiming to gradually further improve facilities over time as funds allow. Recent improvements have seen the refurbishment of the Ladies' toilet and the installation of a fully accessible toilet for people with mobility issues.

The committee is well aware that there is a long way to go to bring the Hall up to a modern standard. Grants are currently being sought to allow the construction of a new access between the Hall and the open space of Lower Town Place, which would give a much safer entrance for families and particularly for the supervision of children in keeping them away from the dangers of the road. Planning permission has been received for this. The old oil tank also needs relocating and the central heating boiler replacing so that the Hall and water can be heated using biofuel.

The Youth Club would very much like to help with the refurbishment of the small room in the Hall to produce a more conducive space for social interaction and play rather than it simply acting as an extra storage space as tends to happen now. This will hopefully be started in the New Year.

The committee is also well aware that much of the kitchen equipment is sub-standard and as soon as funds allow these will be upgraded. Likewise, the gents loo needs a facelift and the hall chairs are past their best.

So much work to do and rising costs do not help with this at all. Fund raising is planned for next year with a quiz taking place later in the winter. As always, any help anyone can give to the running and management of the Victory Hall would be much appreciated.

BUCKET LIST ADVENTURE

Peru, or more specifically Machu Pichu, has been on my bucket list for many years and last year I finally booked my holiday of a lifetime. As a solo traveller, I thought it made sense to join a planned tour and it turned out to be absolutely the right decision.

Our group was an eclectic mix of 22 Brits. We made ourselves known to each other before arriving in Peru where we were met at Lima airport by our local rep, Ruben. A coach took us to the hotel for our first night stay where we enjoyed a complimentary cocktail, a 'Pisco Sour', the national drink of Peru (and apparently, John Wayne's favourite).

The first full day saw embarking on a tour of Lima which included pyramids, the old city centre, a convent, a museum of Incan history & culture and Paddington Bear! After this we headed for the airport for a flight to Cusco and from there by bus to the Sacred Valley where we would be staying for the next two nights. We were glad to get to the hotel after a long day but all excited for our trip the next day, the highlight of the tour, Machu Pichu.

We were on the road by 6.30am to catch a train to Machu Pichu. Dancers in traditional dress performed whilst we waited to board the train, which wound it's way slowly up the mountain for about 1.5 hours! We then boarded a bus to take us up a very windy, steep road to Machu Pichu. Here we met our guide for the day, Hugo. Hugo was Incan and would prove to be an amazing source of information and funny too! He named our group the 'Chasquis', they were Incan messengers, who could by running in relay, travel about 45 kilometres in half a day. At that altitude!



Our access point into the site was via a forested path and rounding a corner we were met with the first awesome sight of Machu



Pichu. The weather was perfect. The views were stunning. There was plenty of time for photos, with Hugo taking both individual and group shots for us all. We learned about the construction methods for the famous terraces, the houses and how the Incas got fresh, running water to multiple places on site and used silver lined water bowls as mirrors. Machu Pichu took about 80 years to complete. Incan society was cashless. There was no currency but people still had to 'pay' taxes. They did this by working for free for about 2 months a year. Most of the labour to build Machu Pichu was provided by local people who were 'paying' their taxes.


The icing on the cake was the solar halo that appeared shortly after we arrived. A phenomenon none of us had experienced before and Hugo had only seen three times previously in his 10 years as a Machu Pichu guide. The tour lasted about 3 hours. It was quite hard work physically. At about 8,00 ft above sea level the air is quite thin and there are lots of steps to climb. We had a delicious buffet lunch before heading back to our hotel.

Next morning we were back on the bus again, this time to travel through the Sacred Valley, with Cusco (the City of Kings) as our

destination. Our guide, Joseph talked about Incan history & Culture and gave us all sorts of interesting bits of information, such as there are over 6,000 varieties of potato grown in Peru.

We had a brief stop to try one of the most famous Peruvian dishes – Guinea Pig. Not everyone tried it. I did. It was OK, not sure I would try it again. We then went on to Ccaccaccollo, where we met with the ladies of a women's weaving co-operative. We put on local costumes (including the men). The ladies danced and sang with us, gave us foliage to feed to their Alpacas and then we

had a talk on how they spin & dye the





We all piled back into the coach for the last part of the journey to Cusco. The old town centre was a short walk from the hotel, so most of us made our way there for our evening meal. Some of us found the highest Irish Bar in the world and of course had to have a drink to celebrate!

In the morning, we boarded the bus again to begin a day long tour of the sights of Cusco. The first stop was the ruined Incan temple, Sacsayhuamman. For those of you wondering how to pronounce that, locally it's known as 'Sexy Woman', which is close enough! The size of the stones was mind boggling. How on earth did they move and place them so precisely? A lookout point gave amazing views of Cusco and a chance for more photos.



Back on the bus, we headed into Cusco to visit another impressive convent, and from there we walked along the street of the sun, 'Intik'ijllu', one of the oldest roads in Cusco, to the main square and the magnificent cathedral. It was fascinating to learn about the merging of Incan religion and Catholicism. Mary is always shown in a triangle shape, signifying a mountain, one of the symbols for Pachamama (Mother Earth).

That afternoon we all tried our hands at making a Pisco Sour and one of the local speciality dishes, trout ceviche. Both were delicious and followed by a tasty lunch, which set us up for the rest of the day. We walked back to the hotel and had a (mostly)

quiet evening as we were getting up early again the next day when we would be travelling to the town of Puno and Lake Titikaka. A trip that, with some stops, was going to take 12 (yes, 12) hours by bus. I don't think any of us were looking forward to that bus ride.

Bright and early, we boarded what was the most comfortable bus I have ever been on! Acres of space, a foot rest, reclining seat. Maybe the 12 hour journey wouldn't be so bad after all. I sat upstairs to make the most of the views and they were stunning.

Our first stop was at San Perdo Apostol de Andahuaylillas, an old Catholic church with possibly the most beautiful interior I have ever seen. No photos were allowed to be taken of the inside which was a shame, however, they would never have done it justice.




Next stop was a ruined Incan temple complex, Raqchi. The site consisted of the temple building, houses which were made available to rich Incans who were visiting to make offerings to the Gods at the temple and dozens of round storage buildings to



store the offerings. Another amazing location. A stop for lunch came next at a family restaurant where a varied and delicious buffet of local dishes was served. The walk up to the restaurant was a little challenging but well worth it.

Two more stops were scheduled before Lake Titikaka. The first being the highest point we would get to on our trip, 4335 metres (approx. 14,300ft) above sea level. The last stop was at a small museum where we had the chance to have a coffee and buy some souvenirs. Back on the road we passed through the town of Juliaca, described as the 'China of Peru', a place where

anything and everything was made. We arrived at our lakeside hotel after dark so had to wait until the morning to see the view.





We boarded our tour boat and headed for our first stop at a floating island. About 2000 'Urso' people live on these islands that are made of reeds and anchored to the lakebed. There are many of these islands, each with about 20 people. Every island has a president, and the president on the island we visited gave us a talk about life on the lake. Some of us took a ride in a boat made of reeds and then it was back to the tour boat to get to Taquile island. Here we were entertained again by dancers in beautiful costumes and learned a little about the people who lived there. Unlike the women's cop-operative we had visited, all of the weaving is done by the men and they spend most of their time knitting, even as they are walking about.

The walk up to the restaurant was, because of the altitude absolutely exhausting. Our guide kept saying 'don't talk and walk slowly' which didn't help. He also kept saying 'you are almost there, it's just around the corner'.. He lied, but it kept us moving. And the view when we got there was spectacular. Following a simple but tasty lunch we started to make our way slowly back down to the boat, stopping briefly for that most British of things, a paddle in the lake. It wasn't as cold as

we were expecting and was actually quite refreshing on our tired feet.

The last full day of our trip saw us heading to the airport at Juliaca for our flight to Lima. There was a stop at a hilltop temple; another hard climb, but again worth it. Back in Lima we spent the afternoon relaxing, some of us walked to the beach. Lima is one of the few capital cities in the world that is on the coast. Then it was last night dinner & drinks and packing to travel home the following day.

Would I recommend a trip to Peru? Absolutely. The culture, the history, the archaeology, the landscapes, all were fabulous. The people were kind and friendly and of course, there were the Pisco Sours!!!



1 400g tin Butter beans

1 400g tin chopped tomatoes

4oz (100g) celery

8oz (200g) carrots

8oz (200g) celeriac

4oz (100g) mushrooms

8oz (200g) swede

2 red onions

garlic, paprika, a tablespoonful tomato puree, a bay leaf 2 tablespoonfuls olive oil.

Peel and wash the root vegetables and cut into bite size chunks.

Slice the washed celery and mushrooms.

Gently heat the olive oil in a large saucepan and add the vegetables, with a clove of crushed garlic, stirring well.

Add the butter beans, chopped tomatoes, tomato puree, and a teaspoonful of sweet or smoked paprika.

Bring to the boil, season with salt and pepper, add the bay leaf, pour into a casserole.

Cook in a moderate oven until the vegetables are tender.




